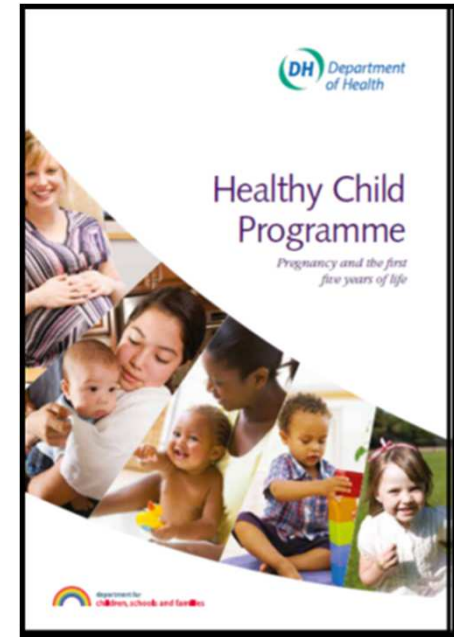
Family Nurse Partnership

- What is this service, who is it for?
- Aims and Outcomes
 - Improved outcomes for baby and mother
 - Effective parenting
 - Higher levels of maternal education and employment
 - Long term impact
- Nottinghamshire Programme
 - Began February 2013
 - 7 Nurses, 167 Clients
 - Performance criteria established and monitored



Health Visiting

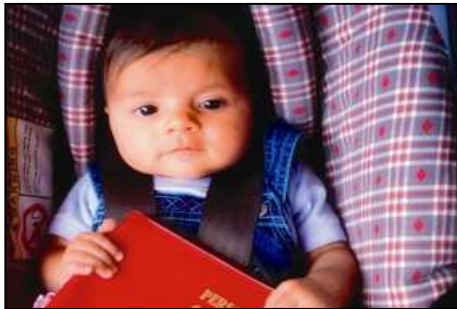
- What is this service, who is it for?
 - Community-Universal-Partnership-Plus
 - Prevention, early help, early intervention
 - All under 5s and their families
- Aims and Outcomes
 - Improved maternal and child outcomes
 - Target services-reduce inequalities
- Nottinghamshire Programme
 - 9,000 births per year, 46,000 under 5s
 - Increasing numbers of HVs in post: target 158+
 - NHS England lead commissioning-monitor performance

School Nursing

- What is this service, who is it for?
 - Community-Universal- Partnership-Plus
 - Prevention, early help, early intervention
 - All 5-19 year olds
- Aims and Outcomes
 - Improve outcomes for children and young people
 - Target services-reduce inequalities
- Nottinghamshire Programme
 - 134,500 5-19 year olds, over 340 schools
 - 18.5 fully trained SN and 33 general nurses
 - Service review completed, regional benchmarking
 - Specification and performance requirements agreed 2014-15



Healthy Schools Programme

- What is this service, who is it for?
 - Specialist team, support to schools to achieve **Healthy School Status**
 - All schools invited to engage
- Aims and Outcomes
 - Improved pupil health and wellbeing
 - Improved educational outcomes, including attainment
- Nottinghamshire Programme
 - Comprehensive review completed
 - Service specification, performance requirements developed
