## **Conducting Member Visits to Adult Care Establishments: Local Authority Comparisons**

Northamptonshire County Council	- Members do visit Care establishments, but it is not compulsory. In general this is undertaken to give them further insight into the care services that NCC purchase.	<ul> <li>Members don't complete tasks as part of a quality assurance role.</li> <li>Members will feedback to Officers their observations about particular services, both good and bad, but this is not normally a formal process.</li> </ul>	- Council engages with Northamptonshire LINk (Local Information Network) and they have recruited a number of lay assessors who are now visiting establishments, unannounced, to carry out audits of the service. The findings of which are formally recorded.	<ul> <li>LINk inspections are unannounced.</li> <li>Member visits are announced but, as mentioned, are not formal inspections.</li> </ul>

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Leicestershire County Council	- No direct visits but there are current proposals for a Member Reference Panel on the quality of care and arrangements for the safeguarding of vulnerable adults in care establishments.	The panel would be considering quality assurance but not via a visit rota.	The Panel would be harmonious with CQC priorities.	- N/A
