REGISTRATION SERVICE: UPDATE ON APPROVED PREMISES


Purpose of the report

1. To advise the Public Protection and General Purposes Committee on the current criteria for Approved Premises for Civil Marriages and the availability and take-up in Nottinghamshire.

Background

- 2. Since 1995 Nottinghamshire County Council is able to authorise the use of certain appropriate venues to become regular venues for civil marriage ceremonies and issues a 3-year licence for that purpose.
- 3. To become an Approved Premise a business needs to show that their premises meet strict criteria covering :
 - health, safety and Fire Service checks
 - facilities for the disabled
 - planning consent
 - religious links
 - seemingly and dignified in use, situation, construction, state of repair and furnishings
 - able to comply with the rules of the ceremony
- 4. Presently there are 33 venues licensed as Approved Premises. They range from hotels and historical buildings (Newstead Abbey and former pumping stations) to sports grounds and County Hall.
- 5. More than half of the venues are situated in the more southerly part of the County (Rushcliffe, Broxtowe, Gedling and Newark), with one third of the total being located within the Rushcliffe Registration District alone. The most popular venue (by number of marriage ceremonies per year) continues to be Newstead Abbey, former home of Lord Byron. A list of Approved Premises in Nottinghamshire is attached as the Appendix to this report.

- 6. The fees for Registration staff to attend any of these venues is set by the County Council and currently stands at £190, Monday to Saturday and £260, Sundays and Bank Holidays.
- 7. Below is a chart showing the level of usage of Approved Premises, with a comparison against Register Office marriage ceremonies.
