Every Child Matters

- Infant deaths are 50% more common among those from manual backgrounds than among those from non manual backgrounds.
- By the age of three being in poverty makes a difference equivalent to nine months' development in school readiness.
- 1,400 lives would be saved per year among those under 15 if child poverty were eradicated.

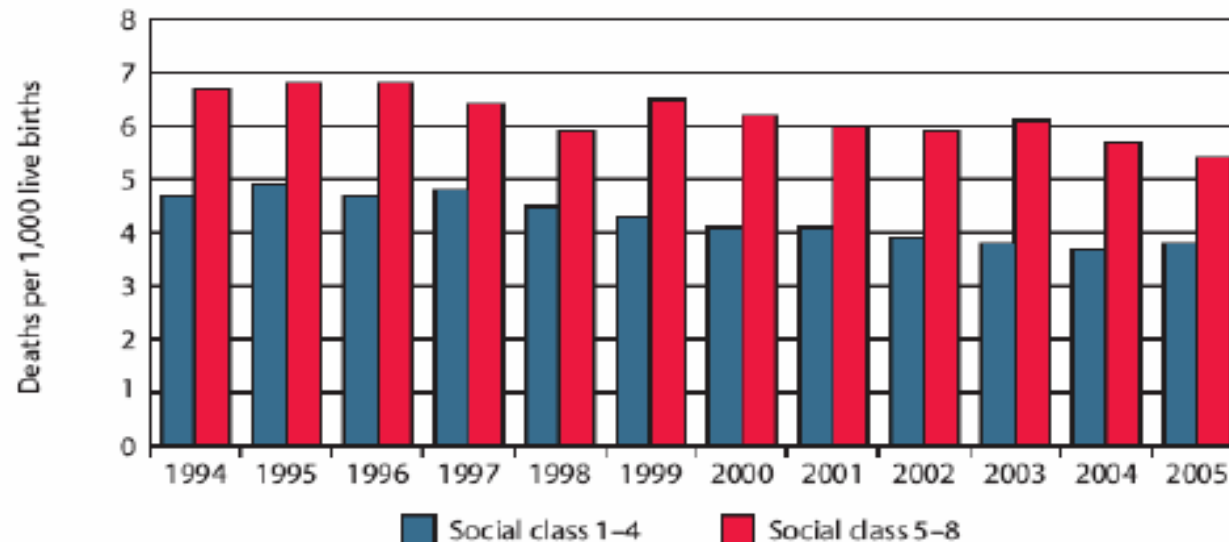


Every Family Matters

- Children of prisoners have three times the risk of mental health problems, anti social behaviour, exhibit low self confidence, truanting and stress related conditions.
- Children born to teenage parents have a high risk of poverty and are twice as likely as other individuals to become teenage parents themselves, creating intergeneration cycles of deprivation.
- Children growing up in families with financial difficulties have worse employment prospects aged 23 than others with the same home factors and educational outcomes.



Number of infant deaths per 1,000 live births



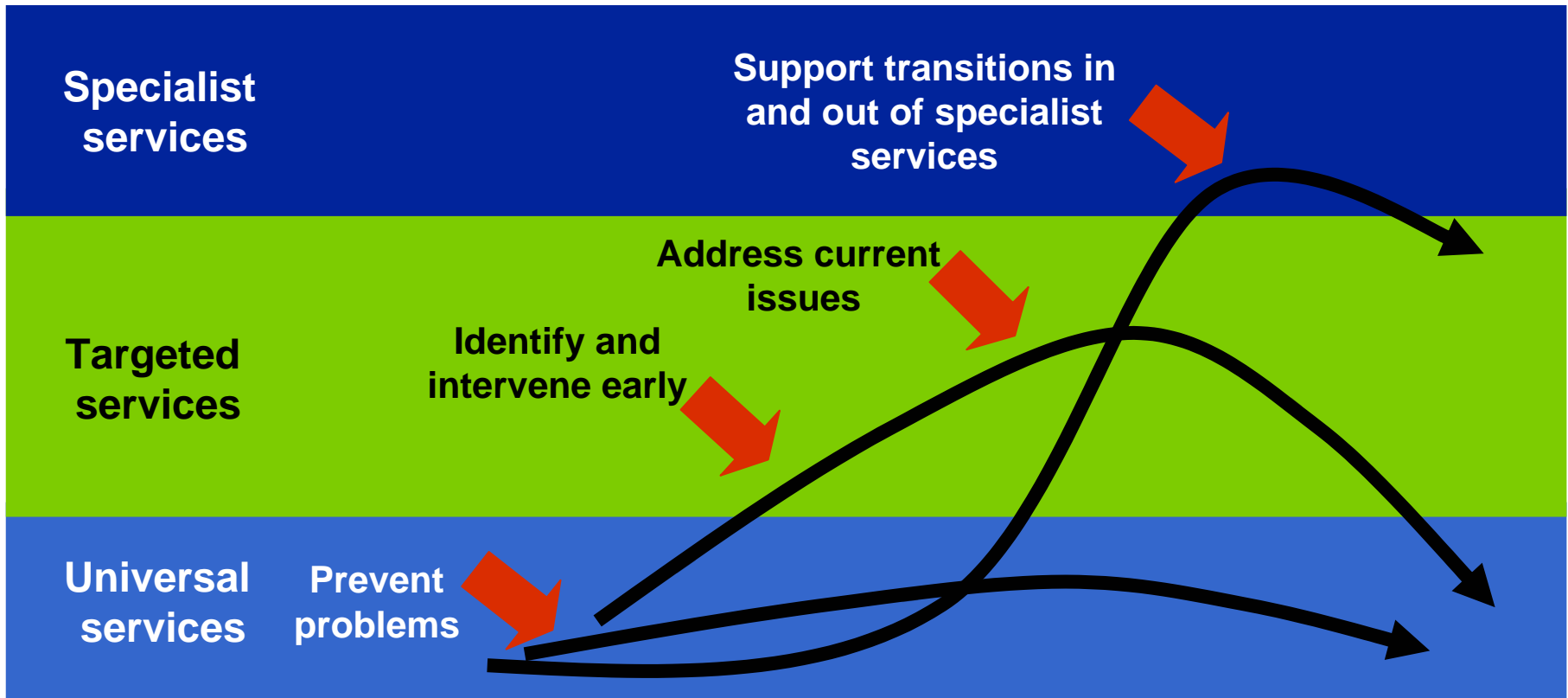
A strengths based approach

- listen to and value what children, young people, parents and carers tell us
- focus on strengths as well as needs
- ensure that the child, young person or carer is fully involved in decision making and planning
- respect children, young people and parents
- training in strengths based approaches planned
- Schools are at the centre of the work we do.



Effective support puts the Child at the centre

Targeted support has a particular focus on ensuring that vulnerable children & young people get timely and coordinated help to prevent their problems escalating or arising at all



What are we doing in Nottinghamshire?

Children's Centres

- Nottinghamshire has 48 children's centres currently designated and providing the core offer of;
 - Integrated care and education
 - Access to child and family health
 - Access to family support services
 - Access to Job Centre Plus
 - Access to child minder networks
- By 2010 all pre school children in Nottinghamshire will be able to access a children's centre

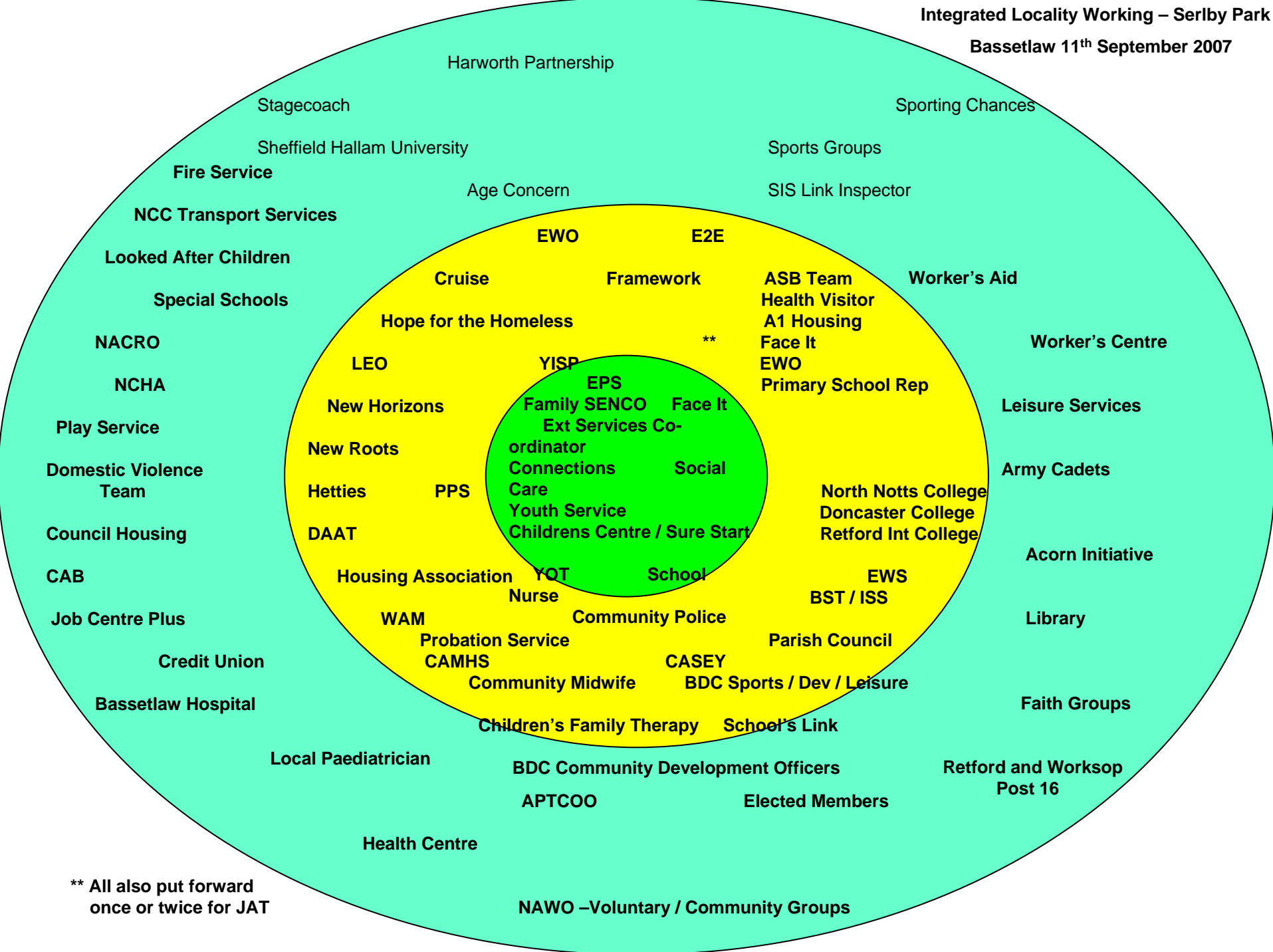
Extended services in schools

- Nottinghamshire currently has 192 schools who provide the full core offer of extended services;
 - A varied menu of activities including study support
 - Access to Child Care (primary schools only)
 - Access to parenting support
 - Swift and easy access to services
 - Community access
- By 2010 all of Nottinghamshire's schools will be extended schools

Nottinghamshire Pathway to Integrated Services

- **Integrated Services for Kirkby Pilot (ISK)**
 - improve access to multi-agency services for children, young people and their families
 - enable services and agencies to work together in order to make best use of resources and expertise, whilst avoiding duplication
- **Joint Access Teams (JATs)**
 - JATs now established in all the families of schools in Ashfield and in Newark & Sherwood plus at least one family of school in every district
 - currently, 28 families of schools have JATs
 - By 2010, all families of schools will have JATs
