REPORT OF THE GROUP MANAGER PLANNING**APPLICATION TO DEFRA FOR LOCAL NATURE PARTNERSHIP STATUS****Purpose of the Report**

1. To provide an update on progress to deliver the Local Nature Partnerships element of the Natural Environment White Paper.
2. To seek approval for the County Council to support the submission of an application to DEFRA to establish the Lowland Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire Local Nature Partnership.

Information and Advice

3. The Government has stated that it wants this generation to be the first to leave the natural environment in a better condition than it inherited and in June 2011 it published the Natural Environment White Paper, *"The Natural Choice: securing the value of nature"*, outlining its vision for the natural environment over the next 50 years. The mission to 2020 is to *"halt overall biodiversity loss, support healthy well-functioning ecosystems and establish coherent ecological networks, with more and better places for nature for the benefit of wildlife and people"*.
4. The White Paper recognises the value of the natural environment in supporting economic regeneration, improving public health and wellbeing, giving improved educational outcomes, reducing crime and anti-social behaviour, helping climate change adaptation, and providing vital 'ecosystem services' such as atmospheric, climatic and hydrological regulation, nutrient cycling, soil formation, pest control and pollination.
5. However, the White Paper also highlights that nature is often taken for granted and that the services and benefits it provides are undervalued, particularly in conventional economic assessments and during decision-making. It states that a healthy, properly functioning natural environment is the foundation of sustained economic growth, prospering communities and personal wellbeing, and that action needs to be taken across sectors rather than by treating environmental issues in isolation.
6. The Government recognises that effective action is best achieved through a partnership approach, and wants local authorities to work through partnerships, linking national environmental priorities to local circumstances. To this end, it is encouraging and supporting the creation of Local Nature Partnerships (LNPs) which will work at a strategic scale, demonstrating local leadership, raising awareness about the vital services and benefits that a healthy natural

environment brings, and contributing to the green economy. Such partnerships will work alongside Local Enterprise Partnerships and Health and Wellbeing Boards and actively engage with other sectors and organisations not traditionally associated with the conservation and enhancement of the natural environment.

7. A one-off fund of £1 million has been provided by the Government to fund capacity-building work to develop the broadened agenda required by the new LNP approach. A successful joint bid was made to this funding pot by organisations within Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire (including both County Councils, both Wildlife Trusts, and both Local Biodiversity Action Plan partnerships), for the development of a 'Lowland Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire Local Nature Partnership'. A total of 47 bids covering most of the country were successful, including neighbouring bids from Lincolnshire, the Humber Estuary, the Peak District and South Yorkshire.
8. The capacity-building funding has supported a series of events in April and May with key organisations from the business, community, education, environment, health and land management sectors. These events have explored areas of shared interest and helped to identify both the potential mutual benefits of forming an LNP and some of the key strategic objectives.
9. DEFRA has now written to all the potential LNPs inviting the submission of applications to formally establish the Partnerships. It has also indicated that there will be a single round of applications in June 2012 and that Government intends to announce the successful Local Nature Partnerships in early summer.
10. It is anticipated that, having considered the outcomes of the development work, the partners in Lowland Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire will have reached a decision on whether they wish to submit an application to DEFRA by the end of May. Approval is, therefore, sought for the County Council to support the submission of an application to formally establish a Lowland Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire Local Nature Partnership.

Other Options Considered

11. The County Council could choose not to support the submission of an application to DEFRA. The County Council is, however, one of the leading partners in the current work arising from the Natural Environment White Paper and has taken the lead role in the development work for the Local Nature Partnership. If the County Council does not support an application, the remaining partners could still choose to submit one but it is considered unlikely that they will do so.

Reason/s for Recommendation/s

12. Key messages arising from the events with the business, community, education, environment, health and land management sectors were that a Local Nature Partnership could offer the opportunity to deliver benefits across sectors and at a greater scale than is achievable through existing county-based environmental partnerships. The potential to identify and overcome barriers to action; share evidence, expertise and experience; and provide strategic support to communities were also consistent themes. The identification of the potential added value of a

Local Nature Partnership by cross-sectoral partners has informed the recommendation to support an application to DEFRA for formal establishment of a partnership.

Statutory and Policy Implications

13. This report has been compiled after consideration of implications in respect of finance, equal opportunities, human resources, crime and disorder, human rights, the safeguarding of children, sustainability and the environment and those using the service and where such implications are material they are described below. Appropriate consultation has been undertaken and advice sought on these issues as required.

Financial Implications

The Government has indicated that it expects Local Nature Partnerships to be self-sustaining and it is, therefore, anticipated that all work associated with a Lowland Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire LNP would be contained within the existing resources of the partners.

RECOMMENDATION/S

- 1) To note progress to deliver the Local Nature Partnerships element of the Natural Environment White Paper.
- 2) To approve County Council support for the submission of an application to DEFRA to establish the Lowland Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire Local Nature Partnership.

REPORT OF THE GROUP MANAGER PLANNING**PROJECT CLOSURE REPORT ON THE 6CS STRATEGIC GREEN
INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAMME****Purpose of the Report**

1. To report on the work undertaken through the 6Cs Strategic Green Infrastructure (SGI) Programme and the Project Closure Report.

Information and Advice

2. Natural England defines Green Infrastructure as “a strategically planned and delivered network comprising the broadest range of high quality green spaces and other environmental features...designed and managed as a multifunctional resource capable of delivering those ecological services and quality of life benefits required by the communities it serves and needed to underpin sustainability. Its design and management should also respect and enhance the character and distinctiveness of an area with regard to habitats and landscape types.” It also considers that Green Infrastructure (GI) “needs to be delivered at all spatial scales...accommodating both accessible natural green spaces within local communities and often much larger sites in the urban fringe and wider countryside.”
3. The Three Cities (Derby, Leicester and Nottingham) and the Three Counties (Derbyshire, Leicestershire and Nottinghamshire), or 6Cs, Growth Point came into being in 2006, as one of 29 areas proposed nationally for significant housing growth under the Sustainable Communities Plan.
4. The 6Cs Growth Point Partnership was co-ordinated through a Programme Management Board and this Board took a decision to top slice 10% of Growth Point funding to develop and deliver strategic GI. This was strongly recommended by the Department of Communities and Local Government (CLG) but was not a mandatory requirement and was testament to the 6Cs Growth Point Partnership's commitment to the importance of delivering strategic GI to support growth.
5. A Strategic Green Infrastructure Board was formed to co-ordinate the delivery of an agreed programme comprising:
 - the production of the 6Cs GI Strategy and Action Plan to provide a long term vision and strategic framework for the delivery of GI across the sub-region and a robust evidence base for the LDF process;

- administration of Growth Point funding for SGI;
- championing GI and promoting best practice.

Membership of the Board includes Country Land and Business Association, Derby City Council, Derbyshire County Council, English Heritage, Environment Agency, Forestry Commission, Greenspace East Midlands, Leicester City Council (Accountable Body), Leicestershire County Council (Secretariat), Natural England (Chair), Nottingham City Council, Nottinghamshire County Council (Vice Chair) and the voluntary sector through East Midlands Environment Link.

6. The programme is now coming to a close and the Project Closure Report will provide detail on the work undertaken on each strand of the programme. Key achievements from the Report are included here. The table below summarises the total programme budget and expenditure:

REPORT OF GROUP MANAGER PLANNING**GREENWOOD COMMUNITY FOREST****Purpose of the Report**

1. To provide members with information on the work of the Greenwood Community Forest Partnership and how this supports NCC priorities.
2. To seek endorsement of proposals relating to future priorities for the Partnership.

Information and Advice**Background**

3. Greenwood Community Forest was established in 1992, as one of 12 Community Forests created to improve the environment of urban fringe areas around England's major conurbations.
4. Greenwood is managed by a partnership, which brings together Nottinghamshire County Council alongside five district and borough councils, plus a number of other organisations. (See appendix). The Partnership is steered by a Board, which is currently chaired by Councillor John Cottee, representing Nottinghamshire County Council.
5. The Greenwood team comprises three officers who are employed by Nottinghamshire County Council on behalf of the partnership.

Activities

6. The agreed "mission" for Greenwood is "to work in partnership to enable Nottinghamshire's communities to create, care for and to use woodlands and other high quality accessible green spaces in a sustainable way that benefits the environment, landscape and the local economy."
7. Greenwood's partners have planted over 1,300ha of new woodland, as well as improving management of woodland and other habitats and improving access to the countryside. Greenwood has helped to regenerate former coal pit and other "waste" sites into well-loved community woodlands and green spaces, a number of which are managed by Nottinghamshire County Council.
8. The Greenwood team has carried out significant activities to involve local communities, including:
 - 8.1. Encouraging local groups to plant trees in their own neighbourhood
 - 8.2. Organising events to make local people more aware of their local green spaces, its biodiversity and cultural heritage
 - 8.3. Helping local schools to use outdoor spaces for creative learning opportunities
 - 8.4. Finding innovative ways to promote active use of outdoor spaces to encourage good health

- 8.5. Improving access for all, to allow disabled people to enjoy the countryside
- 8.6. Supporting “Friends” groups to care for, improve and promote local parks and green spaces
- 8.7. Developing the Friends of Greenwood Community Forum to encourage individual groups to share experience and to support each other
- 8.8. Helping individuals and groups to develop skills and confidence in meeting their own aspirations for local green spaces

Links to NCC priorities

- 9. Greenwood’s activities support a number of priorities within Nottinghamshire County Council’s Strategic Plan:
 - 9.1. Tree planting and environmental improvements support the priority of promoting economic prosperity and safeguarding the environment. Improving the overall quality of local green spaces supports the associated aim of increasing public satisfaction with the area that they live in.
 - 9.2. Support of local Friends groups addresses the priority of fostering aspiration, independence and personal responsibility. Such groups provide a mechanism for local people to have a say and to make a difference in how their local green space is managed and used.
 - 9.3. Active local involvement also supports the priority of making Nottinghamshire a safer place to live. Friends groups act as the “eyes and ears” for green spaces, reporting on anti social behaviour, carrying out practical works like litter picking and encouraging all local residents to appreciate the value of parks on their doorstep.

Looking forward

- 10. The Greenwood team is currently discussing its upcoming work programme with partners. Outline proposals include:
 - 10.1. Continue to support Friends groups individually (according to need) and collectively (via organisation of annual Awards).
 - 10.2. Assist development of the Friends of Greenwood Community Forum to be more self-sustaining.
 - 10.3. Develop a “Trees for Shade” project to respond to the needs of climate change adaptation and protecting health.
 - 10.4. Support establishment of Sherwood Forest Regional Park by developing projects to take forward the concept of “green tourism”, drawing on and sustaining the local environment.
 - 10.5. Seek external funding to provide sustainability and to build on the partnership’s strengths.

Other Options Considered

- 11. Wider discussion and detail will be agreed by the Greenwood Partnership Board.

Reason/s for Recommendation/s

- 12. To note Greenwood’s support of various NCC objectives (see paragraph 9) and to support the County Council’s representative on the Greenwood Board in providing guidance on future priorities.

Statutory and Policy Implications

13. This report has been compiled after consideration of implications in respect of finance, equal opportunities, human resources, crime and disorder, human rights, the safeguarding of children, sustainability and the environment and those using the service and where such implications are material they are described below. Appropriate consultation has been undertaken and advice sought on these issues as required.

Financial Implications

14. Nottinghamshire County Council's contribution of £77,700 to the Greenwood Partnership is contained within the Conservation team budget.
