We predicted that significant changes to the national regulations on fixed period and permanent exclusions would have an adverse impact on exclusions when they came in to force in September 2007. Early indications are that this has been the case. Permanent secondary exclusions from September 2007 to March 2008 were 105 compared to 81 for the equivalent period in the previous year (a 21% increase).

Commentary

Activities undertaken during 2007/08

What did we do?

Developing effective school partnerships across the county.

Three of our seven districts had a long tradition of secondary schools working in partnership to prevent exclusion, offer managed moves and develop alternative provision. Our aim was to develop this across all seven districts and we have now achieved this. All seven districts now have a partnership group on which all secondary schools are represented. These groups commission alternative provision, arrange managed moves and use a shared budget to target support for pupils at risk of exclusion. We undertook targeted work with one district (Ashfield) where exclusions were rising dramatically and subsequently this area has seen a slower rise in permanent exclusions this year than the county average (11% compared to 21%). Two of the other newer partnerships have achieved a reduction in exclusions (Gedling down from 19 to 13) or a levelling off (Rushcliffe 13 exclusions last year and this).

• Support the development of integrated children's services to contribute to a reduction in exclusions and provide support to those at risk of being excluded.

We see effective local integrated services as one of the ways to support pupils at risk of exclusion. We have developed a pilot Joint Area Team (JAT) in each of our seven districts. Services supporting pupils at risk of exclusion (Behaviour Support Team, EPS and EWS) and schools are actively engaged in the JATs and we are confident that this will ensure that the JATs are aware of, and can co-ordinate support to, pupils at risk of exclusion. The family of schools that became the pilot for JAT developments (Kirkby)

has seen a reduction in both permanent and fixed period exclusions.

Work with the DCSF advisor and share good practice across the county

Our regional Behaviour & Attendance Advisor has begun a programme of work with officers leading the school partnerships so as to learn from regional best practice. She also works with our B&A steering group to advise on developments in relation to SEAL and work with priority schools.

In addition

We have identified behaviour as a key theme of enquiry in the current SEN review due to report later this year.

We have developed the national PRAB (Parental responsibility, behaviour and attendance) measures in to local arrangements that make parent support and training available to all secondary schools to include in parenting agreements and parenting orders

Our Behaviour Support Team has focussed its efforts on supporting systemic developments in schools and on providing a countywide programme of training.

We were a pilot authority for the new national qualification 'Lead Professional Behaviour and Attendance' and train two cohorts of local teachers through this programme each year.

We have a very positive reputation for our SEAL work in primary schools and have made excellent progress with launching Secondary SEAL.

We offer a programme of support to Lead Behaviour and Attendance Professionals (LBAPs) in our schools and 150 schools take part in our LBAP local networks.

Interestingly, and as we predicted, this has been accompanied by a dramatic decrease in the number of fixed-period exclusions over the same period. 1-5 day fixed-period exclusions in secondary schools fell from 3,657 to 3166 (13% reduction). 6-15 day fixed-period exclusions fell from 472 to 50 (89% reduction) and 16-45 day fixed-period exclusions fell from 55 to 7 (87% reduction). In effect what schools appear to be doing in response to the new regulations is to issue permanent exclusions in cases which in the past would have led to fixed-period exclusion. In doing so schools are freed from the obligation to provide full-time education for the excluded young people. A positive consequence of this strategy by schools, however, has been a dramatic drop in the number of days lost to learning due to exclusion which has fallen to 8,994 in the school year so far, compared to 15,002 in the same period in the previous year (40% decrease).

It will only be possible to establish how far this pattern of changes (increased permanent exclusion and decreased fixed period exclusion) is part of a national pattern resulting from new regulations, once the

national data is published. All the previous national data on exclusions has shown that Nottinghamshire's level of exclusions is average compared with regional and national levels and we believe that when the national data becomes available we will see that this continues to be the case.

The family of schools that became the pilot for JAT developments (Kirkby) has seen a reduction in both permanent and fixed period exclusions. Permanent exclusions fell from 13 to 9 in the family following the development of the JAT, days lost to learning as a result of exclusion fell from 494 to 325, and the number of pupils receiving an exclusion of any sort fell from 90 to 76. Data for September 2007 to March 2008 confirm that these improvements are continuing in the current school year.

What pressures or difficulties have been encountered that may have impacted on performance. Where applicable please comment on how these have been overcome and what lessons have been learnt.

As discussed above the most significant impact on our outcomes in this area have been prompted by national changes to the regulations on education of excluded pupils. These have created a perverse incentive for schools to issue permanent exclusions rather than fixed period exclusions, since this frees them from any duty tom provide education for the excluded pupil.

Planned future activities to further improve performance

What will we do next?

- We will continue to develop school partnerships as we believe they offer a strong mechanism
 for reducing exclusions. We will focus on developing greater consistency in their operation
 across districts and ensuring all of them meet the 'Five design principles' for this work.
- We will implement the recommendations of the SEN Review in relation to behaviour
- We will audit the impact of JATs on exclusions in their area and implement improvements that learn from the most effective JATs.

PROVIDING SUFFICIENT OUT OF SCHOOL PLACES FOR PERMANENTLY EXCLUDED AND OTHER LEARNERS IN THE NOTTINGHAMSHIRE LEARNING CENTRE (NLC)

REVIEW OF PROGRESS SINCE OCTOBER 2007

Introduction

Following a review of provision undertaken in January 2006 a range of actions have been taken to ensure that the NLC is able to provide suitable full time provision for children and young people on its roll.

The actions taken, which commenced in March 2006, are as a result of collaboration with other local authority services and have been reviewed termly in order to maintain the momentum of improvement.

The essence of the action undertaken focuses on activities which:

- **prevent** increasing trends in pupil exclusion
- provide education to young people out of school
- return young people to school or appropriate provision

Summary of activities undertaken since October 2007

Prevent

Behaviour has long been a priority for school staff, parents and governors alike and the significant changes which the Government introduced in 2007 reinforce the importance of working together to achieve the required statutory standards around exclusions. These new regulations provide a greater clarity for schools, pupils, parents and governors along with the local authority, and require effective collaborative procedures to deal with behaviour related matters.

'Working together to prevent and manage exclusions in Nottinghamshire – Guidance for LA staff in the Inclusion Services' identifies the aims of the Behaviour Support Team as:

- improving a school's capacity to promote positive behaviour
- advising on the management of the behaviour of the individual C&YP

The Behaviour Support Team (BST) has contributed to this focus in a number of ways since October 2007. The BST has:

- produced CYP guidance on the use of Physical Intervention in Nottinghamshire (being signed off by Safeguarding Board later this month); it provides clear policy and guidance for staff in schools and across the dept on safe handling
- continued to run approximately weekly sessions to school staff in de-escalation techniques as well as the monthly "carousel" of more direct physical intervention strategies
- produced anti-bullying guidance document for all schools across the County
- established anti-bullying strategy group and achieved 70% of intended outcomes on the interim action plan

- organised an anti-bullying poster campaign, a huge success with calendars, postcards etc produced; work involved BST, library service, Connexions and Youth Service predominantly
- planned anti-bullying conferences for spring term involving schools and pupils to revise / produce school policy documents; secondary conference is being run jointly with Police and Nottingham City
- worked with EWS to ensure clear guidance is available to schools regarding Behaviour Parenting contracts and orders; arranged a pilot briefing to Mansfield secondary schools in February; further roll-out across county after Easter
- provided targeted support, in addition to core work, to six schools through the PFG process
- provided Kirkby schools with weekly solution circles for staff (well attended)
- increased the amount of direct support to teaching staff in both primary and secondary schools in the form of "surgeries/clinics"; support is well received and there is an increasing demand for this type of work
- increased the incidence of solution focussed teacher coaching and more conventional coaching this term; referrals are received through the 'Schools Causing Concern' group
- supported Springboards which continue to be well attended and are ever evolving
- increased the use of pupil exclusion data by BST staff to support schools to target support in a more preventative way
- analysed fixed-period exclusion data to identify schools with particular systemic exclusion issues and worked with them to address both cause and symptoms
- developed new programmes of training around "Managing Extreme Emotions" and "Arts and Emotions", available to primary and secondary schools through county event as well as bespoke training

From the start of the autumn term 2007 the Education and Inspections Act (2006) required all schools to provide full time off-site education for fixed–period excluded pupils from the sixth day of fixed–period exclusion. The picture of pupil exclusions across Nottinghamshire Primary Schools during the autumn term 2007 indicates:

- 20% reduction in days lost to exclusion (compared with autumn term 2006)
- low levels of f-p exclusion sustained
- 93% reduction in 6+ day f-p exclusions
- little variance in ratio of permanent exclusions

The picture for our Secondary Schools indicates:

- 33% reduction in days lost to exclusion (compared with autumn term 2006)
- 15% reduction in pupils excluded
- 88% reduction in 6+ day f-p exclusions
- 13% increase in permanent exclusions

Provide

The LA is statutorily responsible for ensuring that suitable full-time education is provided from the sixth day of each permanent exclusion. This new duty is, in most cases, discharged by the Nottinghamshire Learning Centre (NLC).

Since the start of the autumn term 2007 the NLC has:

- increased the number of places at NLC Adventure
- continued to utilise the enhanced support from EWS
- committed extra funding for additional Provision Plus to meet the demands of high exclusion rates in some areas of the county
- appointed an Inclusion Co-ordinator in October 2007 to monitor learner provision and transition across the NLC
- held bi-weekly learning centre provision meetings to improve provision levels
- enhanced provision levels for provision by the 6th day– from a low of 5% for summer term 2007 to 52% across the autumn term, with a target of 100% of p/exd students on the roll of their learning centre from the sixth school day
- established assessment groups in two learning centres to provide for newly admitted pupils whilst their medium-term education plan is arranged; this separates them from the longer term pupils and should facilitate timely returns to school for young people
- established procedures for accessing enhanced funding to support additional staffing/resources costs for complex learners within the NLC
- established a partnership arrangement with a local special school to provide additional teaching space/facilities/staffing
- established two full-time primary classes at the Oakdale and Grove LCs
- introduced managed moves of learners within the NLC to share resources/expertise

An overview of permanent exclusions data for Sept 2007 – 8th Feb 2008 shows that:

- 95 p/exd students were admitted to the LCs since Sept 2007 (some from 06/07)
- primary school p/exs were slightly down
- secondary school p/exs were slightly up

Return

In areas where permanent exclusions are relatively low and the local Learning Centre provision is timely and effective, the potential requirements for re-integration are, as a consequence, comparatively low and a return to mainstream is more easily achievable. Since the start of the autumn term 2007 the NLC has:

- convened weekly provision meetings with Inclusion Coordinator/LEO/EWS in targeted areas in order to facilitate timely returns to school
- accessed support from Connexions and EWS to aid transition into school
- engaged the Inclusion Co-ordinator in active involvement in AAPs across the county to evaluate and share good practice
- engaged the Inclusion Co-ordinator in assisting the learning centres and NLC teams in developing transition/reintegration strategies

The imbalance in the numbers of permanent exclusions across the LA's seven districts results in a greater difficulty in reintegrating young people where permanent exclusion numbers are high. Where numbers on roll in the district Learning Centre are high, the capacity to support the receiving school through staff, additional resources and time reduces significantly.

From September 2007 95 p/exd students were admitted across the four Learning Centres and 26 young people admitted to mainstream schools.

Summary

The Nottinghamshire Learning Centre was established in September 2005 following the Best Value Review of the Behaviour Support Service. In the seven academic terms since its inception pupil numbers across the four Learning Centres have increased dramatically.

Pupil number data illustrates the increase in learner numbers across all four Learning Centres with the most significant increases being experienced by Oakdale LC where numbers increased from 25 to 78 (+ 212%) between September 2005 and December 2007 and by St George's LC where numbers increased from 18 to 60 (+ 233%) across the same period.

Across all four Learning Centres the pupil number increase equates to 107% over the first three terms (from 75 young people to 155) and had grown to 159% (75 to 194) by the end of term seven, December 2007.

The summary of provision across the four Learning Centres at the end of January 2008 shows that 74% (156) of the total pupil population of 210 students were accessing their sole provision as a result of permanent exclusion and across this specific group of p/exd young people:

- 10 pupils (6%) were KS1/2 and accessed an average of 21.1 hrs of provision
- 50 pupils (32%) were KS3 and accessed an average of 22.1 hrs of provision
- 96 pupils (62%) were KS4 and accessed an average of 23.4 hours of provision

In light of the new obligations placed upon the LA as a result of the 2006 Education and Inspections Act, a review has been commissioned to consider what aids and barriers impact upon the EOTAS "prevent/provide/return" strategy as applied to young people without a mainstream school place as a result of permanent exclusion.

The review was commissioned to identify factors which lead to the timely entry and exit for young people to the Learning Centres, to inform policy and practice in order to meet the new requirements of the Education and Inspection Act 2006 with regards to the provision of full time education for p/exd pupils and to use the outcomes to signpost supportive advice and guidance to both the LA and schools. In its final version the report could be tabled for the Behaviour Sub Committee to consider as part of its work towards the SEN Review.
