Unemployment according to the Government's preferred measure was 2.12million in the three months to May 2014, down 121,000 from the previous three months and down 383,000 from the same period a year ago. The unemployment rate was 6.5%, down 0.4 from the previous three months and down 1.3 from a year earlier.

The unemployment rate for 16-24 year olds was 17.8% in the three months to May 2014, down 1.3 percentage points from the previous three months and down 3.1 from a year earlier. Comparisons of youth unemployment over time are complicated by the fact that, unemployment rates are calculated as the number of unemployed people divided by the economically active population (those unemployed plus those employed). Since comparable records began in 1992, the proportion of people aged from 16-24 in full-time

education has increased substantially from 24.3% for March to May 1992 to 42.3% for March to May 2014. Increasing numbers of people going into full-time education reduces the size of the economically active population and therefore increases the unemployment

rate.

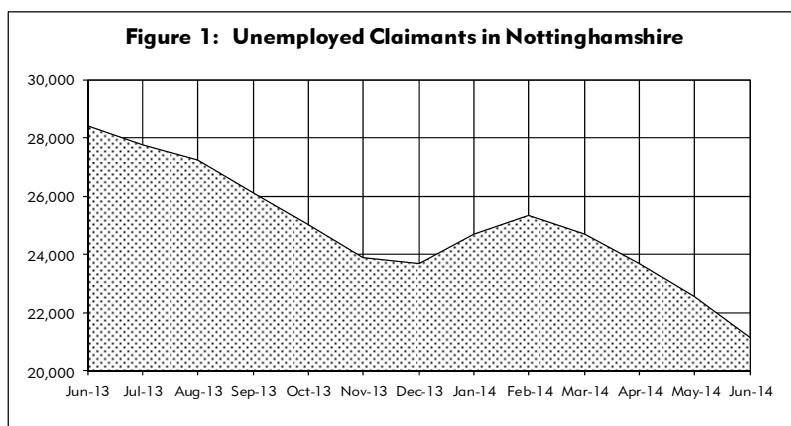
The seasonally adjusted claimant figure for the United Kingdom decreased by 36,300 last month to 1,044,300 and was down 418,900 over the year.

The number of people in employment aged 16 and over increased by 254,000 over the quarter to reach 30.64 million. The employment rate for those aged 16 to 64 is now 73.1%, up 0.5 from the previous quarter and up 1.7 from a year earlier.

The number of people in full-time employment increased by 231,000 on the quarter to reach 22.44 million. The number of people in part-time employment was 8.20 million in the three months to May 2014, up 24,000 on the previous

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quarter.

In the three months to May 2014, there were 8.78 million economically inactive people aged from 16 to 64, down 67,000 from the previous quarter and down 258,000 from a year earlier.

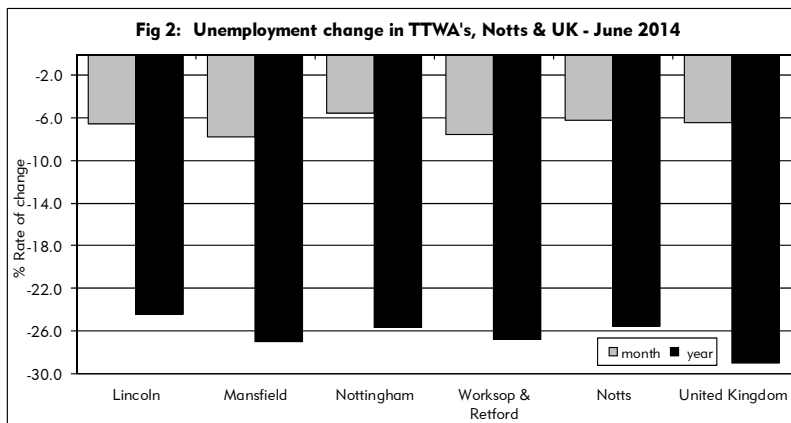
Average total pay (including bonuses) was £478 per week in May 2014. Over the year total pay for employees in Great Britain rose by 0.3%.

Average regular pay (excluding bonuses) was £449 per week in May 2014. Over the year regular pay for employees in Great Britain rose by 0.7%. Between May 2013 and May 2014, the Consumer Prices Index increased by 1.5%.

There were 648,000 job vacancies in the three months to June 2014, up 30,000 from the three months to March 2014 and up 117,000 on a year earlier.

There were 3.3 unemployed people per vacancy in the period from March to May 2014, down 0.5 on the quarter and down by 1.5 on the year.

In the three months to May 2014, 116,000 people became redundant in the three months prior to their Labour Force Survey interview. This is down 1,000 from the previous three months and down 2,000 on the year. The redundancy rate was 4.5 per 1,000 employees, down 0.1 from the



previous three months and down 0.2 from a year earlier.

The unadjusted claimant figure for the United Kingdom has decreased by 69,686 over the month to 1,020,290. The proportion unemployed calculated on the residence base now stands at 2.5% of the population aged 16-64.

The number of claimants in Nottinghamshire decreased by 1,390 between May and June 2014. The total of 21,146 is 7,278 less than it was a year ago (see figure 1).

The proportion unemployed in Nottinghamshire is now 3.0%. This is higher than the East Midlands (2.3%) and the United Kingdom (2.5%).

Between May and June 2014, unemployment decreased in all of the four Travel To Work Areas in the County (figure 2). Mansfield experienced the largest decrease, with a rate of

change of -7.8%, followed by Worksop & Retford with -7.6%, Lincoln with -6.5% and Nottingham with -5.5%.

Compared with May 2013, all of the four TTWA's in the County have reduced numbers of claimants. The largest change has been in Mansfield with a rate of change of -27.0% followed by Worksop & Retford with -26.8%, Nottingham with -23.9% and Lincoln with -24.5%.

Unemployment decreased in all of the seven Local Authority Districts in the County between May and June 2014. The largest decreases were in Ashfield with a rate of change of -10.0%, Newark & Sherwood with -8.8% and Bassetlaw with -8.2%. Unemployment in the City of Nottingham decreased by 520 over the month resulting in a rate of change of -4.8%.

The rates of change have varied throughout the County

The rates shown in tables 1-4 are supplied by ONS. They are calculated by expressing the claimant count figures as a proportion of the resident population aged 16-64 derived from the latest mid-year population figures.

over the year, from -34.8% in Broxtowe to -24.2% in Mansfield. Nottingham City changed by -21.4% over the year.

Unemployment decreased in all of the eight Parliamentary Constituencies in the County during June. Newark recorded the largest decrease, experiencing a rate of change of -10.2% followed by Ashfield with -9.4% and Sherwood with -8.1%. Over the month Nottingham East has

changed by -4.5%, Nottingham North by -5.7% and Nottingham South by -4.1%.

All of the eight Parliamentary Constituencies in the County have decreased numbers of claimants compared with the same period last year resulting in rates of change ranging from -23.9% in Bassetlaw to -34.1% in both Broxtowe and Gedling. The three Nottingham Constituencies have rates of change of -17.2% in

Nottingham East, -25.3% in Nottingham North and -22.3% in Nottingham South.

New Disclosure Control Procedures with JSA Claimant Count Data

A new disclosure control procedure has been introduced with JSA claimant count data on NOMIS with effect from 15th November. The procedure follows an interim review of the confidentiality of JSA claimant count data, and is required for compliance with the National Statistics Code of Practice for Data Access and Confidentiality. This is an interim measure pending a thorough assessment of the risk to the confidentiality of claimant count data early next year.

The procedure is the primary suppression of any cell count of 1 or 2, which is instead denoted by the symbol '#'. A true value of zero continues to be shown as 0.

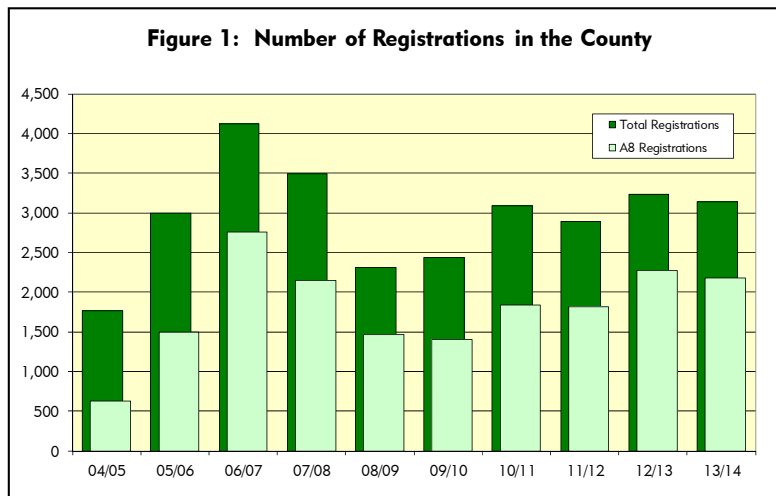
National Insurance Number allocations to overseas nationals entering the UK - 2013/14

This report provides statistics regarding National Insurance Numbers (NINo) allocated to adult overseas nationals entering the United Kingdom during the financial year 2013/14 as released by the Department for Work and Pensions on 22nd May 2014.

A NINo is generally required by any overseas national looking to work or claim benefits/tax credits in the UK, including the self employed or students working part time.

The figures provide a measure of in-migration but do not reflect emigration or the overall migrant population.

The figures reflect adult overseas nationals allocated a NINo through the adult registration scheme. In addition there will be a small number of overseas nationals (aged 16-19 years) allocated a NINo automatically through the Juvenile Registration scheme. This occurs when the



individual has previously been allocated a child registration number. These juvenile cases are not captured by the statistics.

Nationally, the total number of NINo registrations to adult overseas nationals entering the UK in 2013/14 was 603,000 an increase of 40,000 (7%) on the previous year.

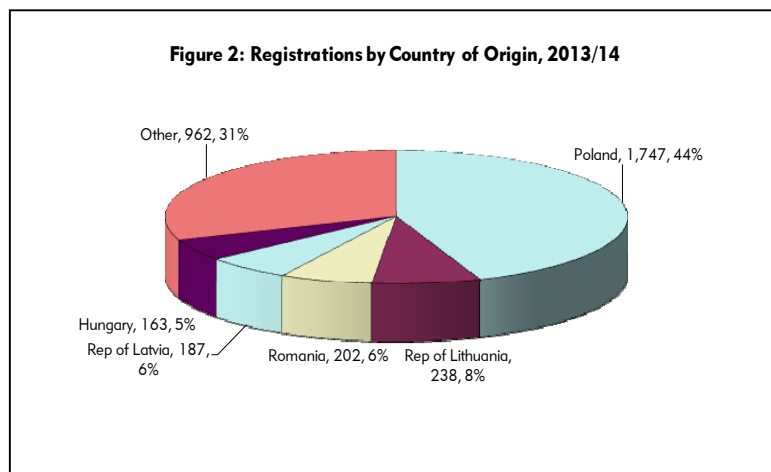
A decrease in number

was experienced in Nottinghamshire where there were 3,135 NINo allocations to non-UK nationals registered in the County in 2013/14. This is down by 99 from the previous year, an decrease of just over 3%.

Of the total, 2,177 or around 70% were from the 'Accession 8' or 'A8' countries which joined the European Union in 2004. This is down

by 89 over the year.

Figure 1 illustrates the trend in the number of NINo allocations for both total registrations and for those people originating from the A8 countries since 2004/05. It can be seen that the number of NINo allocations to people coming from the A8 countries has decreased slightly in the last year after showing a small increase the previous year. Prior to that there had been a

continuing decrease to 2009/10 since its peak of 4,120 allocations in 2006/07.

The NINo data contains details of the district in which people were living when they registered and this is shown in Table 1.

Of the total 3,135 NINo registrations in the County in 2013/14, the largest proportion (26.2%) were living in Gedling. This is followed by Mansfield with 18.3% and Bassetlaw and Broxtowe both with 16.3%.

Figure 2 shows NINo registrations by country of origin. As can be seen, the largest number of people (1,747) from any one country originate from Poland. This is up from 1,282 in the previous year and represents just over 44% of all registrations in the county. The Republic of Lithuania is second with 238 registrations and the Romania is third with 202. Registrations from the Republic of Lithuania are down by 36 from last year but Romania is up by 156. The Republic of Latvia has 187 registrations, down from 204 last year. There were 163 registrations by people from Hungary, up from 149 last year. The remaining 31% is made up from registrations of people from all other countries.

A similar pattern is

evident at the district level. In Bassetlaw for example, almost 84% of all NINo registrations were from people originating from Poland. For the other districts in the County the comparable figures are: Gedling 55%, Ashfield 43%, Rushcliffe 39%, Mansfield 37%, Newark & Sherwood 10% and Broxtowe 10%.

Over 87% of NINo registrations in Gedling and Bassetlaw, 78% in Mansfield and over 63% of registrations in Ashfield were from people originating from the A8 countries.

Broxtowe and to a lesser extent Newark & Sherwood and Rushcliffe show a different pattern by having registrations from people who originate from a broader spread of countries.

In Broxtowe, only 10% of registrations were from people originating from Poland whilst 19% were from Hungary and 8% from China.

In Newark & Sherwood 10% of registrations are from people from Poland, 9% from the Republic of Ireland, 8% from China and 7% from both India and Spain.

In Rushcliffe, although the largest proportion of people from any one country originated from Poland, there were still sizeable proportions

originating from Romania (12%), Italy (9%), and 3% each from India, Greece and Australia.

In total for the County there were 238 registrations from people from the Republic of Lithuania. Interestingly, 136 or over 57% of them were in Mansfield.

Overall, Broxtowe had registrations from people originating from 31 different countries, followed by Newark & Sherwood 20, Ashfield 18, Mansfield 18, Rushcliffe 16, Gedling 14 and Bassetlaw 9.

The information contained in this report concentrates on the area covered by the County Council, but readers may be interested to know that there were more NINo registrations in Nottingham City than in the whole of the rest of Nottinghamshire. There were 5,170 registrations in Nottingham, up from 4,507 last year. The registrations came from people originating from 83 different countries.

Of the total number of NINo registrations in Nottingham, 34% were from Poland, 6% from Romania, 5% from India, 4% from Italy and over 3% each Hungary, Spain, Pakistan and China.

Accession 8 countries comprise of: Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, Republic of Estonia, Republic of Latvia, Republic of Lithuania, Republic of Slovenia, Slovak Republic.
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
