Children's Social Care provides a range of specialist services to ensure that the most vulnerable children and young people in Nottinghamshire receive the support and protection they need to be safe, secure and happy, and to achieve their full potential.

Within Nottinghamshire's Pathway to Provision (link below), Children's Social Care is a specialist level 4 service which means it provides dedicated support, tailored to the complex needs of each child and young person in need of such services.



Social Work Services

Social Work Services encompass the reception, assessment and care planning services for Looked After Children (children in care of the Council), Children in Need (those at risk of significant or further harm to their health or development) and children subject to Child Protection Plans.

Key Services

The Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH)

The Hub receives all new safeguarding concerns and risk assesses these concerns using available information from Police, Health and other partners. This allows timely and informed decisions to be made to safeguard children and young people.

Assessment Services

Assessment Services deal with initial assessments following a referral from the Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub, and Section 47 Child Protection enquiries. Section 47 enquiries are initiated when there is reasonable cause to suspect that a child is suffering or likely to suffer significant harm in the form of physical, sexual, emotional abuse or neglect.

District Child Protection Teams

District Child Protection Teams carry out core assessments and work with cases relating to Children in Need and children on Child Protection Plans. Core assessments are more comprehensive than initial assessments and understand, in detail, a child's circumstances and needs.

Through Care

Through Care is a dedicated service for children in the care of the council, working with children in long term foster care, children with adoption plans, children subject to court proceedings and young people leaving care at 18 years old.

Who can access Social Work Services?

Children's Social Work Services are provided to all children aged 0-16 (and for care leavers aged 16-18) who meet the thresholds for need.

These children and young people commonly require intensive help and support to address significant developmental needs, circumstances regarding their parents and carers, and the effects of environmental factors.

How are the Social Work Services accessed?

The service is accessed by referral through the Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub, which makes a decision on whether a concern regarding a child or young person meets the threshold for intervention by children's social care services.

Where are Social Work Services delivered?

Children's Social Work services are delivered flexibly based on the needs and circumstances of each child and young person. Social workers are deployed across the County to ensure they are based close to the communities they serve.

Children's Disability Service

The Children's Disability Service provides support to children with a disability and their families who require both the services of a specialist social worker and specialist disability services. This group brings together social work services with residential homes for children with a disability, homecare, sitting and befriending, occupational therapy and short breaks.

Key Services

Children's Disability Teams

Children's Disability Teams provide a dedicated service for children with a disability and their families covering the full range of social work services. This includes assessment, child in need and child protection work, work with Looked After Children with a disability, care planning and court work.

Strategic Lead for Personalisation

The Strategic Lead for Personalisation manages occupational therapy services for children with a disability, co-ordination with Public Health and the development of short breaks for families of children with a disability.

Regulated Services Provision

Regulated Services Provision manages three residential homes for children with a disability, and provides community support services such as home care and sitting and befriending.

Who can access the Children's Disability Service?

Children's Social Work Services are provided to all children with a disability aged 0-16 (and for care leavers aged 16-18) who meet the thresholds for need.

How is the Children's Disability Service accessed?

The service is accessed by referral through the Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH), or the Occupational Therapy duty point.

Children's Social Work services for children with a disability are delivered flexibly based on the needs and circumstances of each child and young person. Services for children with a disability are available on a countywide basis.

Access to Resources

Social work teams access a range of specialist provider services from the Access to Resources group to best meet the needs of children and families.

Key Services

Placements, Commissioning and **Corporate Parenting**

Placements, Commissioning and Corporate Parenting procures and manages placements for children in care, and carries out the responsibilities of the Council as the corporate parent for Looked After Children.

Mainstream Residential Homes & Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services

This service manages the Council's residential homes for children in care, the Council's secure children's home, and provides specialist social work support for children with mental health issues.

The Fostering Service

The Fostering Service provides support for foster carers and children in foster care across the county. The service is also responsible for the recruitment of foster carers.

The Adoption Service

The Adoption Service manages the adoption process, matching children with prospective adopters, identifying and recruiting adopters, providing adoption advice and supporting families after adoption.

Family Support

Family Support works to support families in crisis to keep children at home and provides support and advice to families which take on the care of children within their wider family. The service also provides specialist family assessments and manages the contact between children in care and their birth families.

Who is Access to Resources for?

Provider services in the Access to Resources group can be accessed by all children aged 0-16 (and for care leavers aged 16-18) through their social work teams.

These children and young people commonly require intensive help and support to address significant developmental needs, circumstances regarding their parents and carers and the effects of environmental factors.

Where is Access to Resources delivered?

Children's Social Care services are delivered flexibly based on the needs and circumstances of each child and young person. The Access to Resources group provides services on a countywide basis

Safeguarding and Independent Review

Safeguarding and Independent Review leads on issues relating to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children, both within the authority and with partnership agencies through the Nottinghamshire Safeguarding Children's Board. The Independent Chair Service which also sits in this service area is responsible for quality assuring work undertaken with children in care or children involved in the child protection process.

Key Services

Independent Chair Service

The Independent Chair Service provides Independent Reviewing Officers who chair Looked After Children reviews in order to ensure the quality and delivery of plans for Looked After Children.

The service also provides Child Protection Co-ordinators who chair child protection conferences and complex strategy meetings.

Strategic Safeguarding services provide advice on child protection issues, including dedicated advice to schools and children missing education. The service managing

Nottinghamshire Safeguarding Children's Board

The business of the Board is managed by the service, which includes carrying out Serious Case Reviews when a child dies or is seriously injured, and abuse or neglect are known or suspected to be factors in the death.



Who can access Safeguarding and Independent Review?

Services are provided for professionals involved in the safeguarding of children, for example the Local Authority Designated Officer (LADO) function which provides advice, guidance and support in managing allegations against people who work with children.

How is Safeguarding and Independent Review accessed?

The services of Child Protection Co-ordinators and Independent Reviewing Officers are accessed through established social work

processes, for example, Child Protection Conferencing and Looked After Children Reviews. Safeguarding advice is provided through direct contact when requested by other professionals who work with children and young people.

Where is Safeguarding and Independent Review delivered?

Children's Social Care services are delivered flexibly based on the needs and circumstances of each child and young person. Safeguarding and Independent Review services are available on a countywide basis.



Education, Standards and Inclusion is responsible for securing high quality services which are accessible and meet the needs of all children and young people in Nottinghamshire.

Services in the division work closely with schools to raise standards in education, reduce the attainment gap and enable all children to fulfil their potential at school.



Support to Schools

The Support to Schools service is committed to promoting the highest standards of pupil attainment and progress through the development of schools and other educational settings. The service also ensures that there are enough Early Years places available for all children over the age of three in Nottinghamshire, and that no children of statutory school age are left without a school place.

Key Services

The Education Improvement Service

The service supports the development of high quality strategic leadership, teaching and learning with a particular focus on closing the gap for vulnerable groups.

This is delivered through planned and bespoke support packages using various monitoring, training and advice channels. Specific support includes:

- Support for inspection and self-evaluation
- Headteacher performance management
- Programmes to develop leaders and teachers' skills, knowledge and understanding of effective leadership and innovative practice
- Support for all leaders and teachers to contribute to closing the educational gap for vulnerable pupils.

Much of the support offered through the Education Improvement Service is sold, allowing schools to choose where they buy their services from.

Who can access the Education Improvement Service?

The service is aimed at leaders and teachers in primary, secondary and special schools and academies.

How is the Education Improvement Service accessed?

Bespoke consultancy is delivered through on site visits to schools and academies. The universal offer is delivered at a number of venues throughout Nottinghamshire.

The service is designed for:

- Parents and carers seeking school places for their children
- Headteachers and school governors seeking advice and support on issues connected with the allocation of school places, the expansion of provision or the improvement of existing buildings
- Members of Parliament in respect of issues raised by constituents
- Local authority neighbours in respect of issues of a regional concern
- Members and Senior Officers of the County Council seeking advice and guidance on issues relating to the provision of school places and the operation of school buildings in Nottinghamshire.

To ensure that vulnerable children and young people receive additional support, the service:

- Prioritises the applications of Looked After Children (LAC)
- Reviews individually the evidence for applications that may qualify as 'special circumstances'
- Considers applications under the Fair Access Protocol with support from the Fair Access Officer, locality panels and school behaviour and attendance partnerships
- Ensures that Area Officers and the Fair Access Officer provide direct support and guidance to schools, families and colleagues in relation to vulnerable children and young people.

Social, Emotional and Behavioural Development: Policy and Provision

Social, Emotional and Behavioural Development (SEBD) supports permanently excluded young people to ensure they return to mainstream education or other alternative provision as soon as possible. In partnership with schools, the service also helps to prevent children being excluded.

Key Services

Pupil Referral Units

The service is divided into three separate Pupil Referral Units (PRUs) or Learning Centres, each serving different areas of Nottinghamshire. PRUs are described by the Department for Education as a type of Alternative Provision.

Each PRU caters for identified groups of young people across Key Stages 3 and 4. Learning programmes are differentiated by need, reflect mainstream provision and address the causational factors associated with exclusion and social isolation. There is capacity for 44 learners to be on the roll of each PRU.

FAQs

Who are Pupil Referral Units for?

PRUs provide support for permanently excluded young people aged between 11-16 years who are currently not in a mainstream school as a result of their behaviour.

Each PRU supports learners to acquire essential skills needed to return successfully to a mainstream setting and/or other alternative provision. This means each learner has access

to an appropriate curriculum leading to exciting and challenging learning opportunities.

PRUs also develop preventitive strategies for pupils in partnership with mainstream schools to stop children being excluded.

Support for Primary aged pupils is provided by a dedicated team within Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) found in Section 2.3.

How are Pupil Referral Units accessed?

Admission to pupil referral units is primarily through permanent exclusion from mainstream schools. Pupils experiencing difficulties in school may also access short term provision as a preventative measure to permanent exclusion.

Where are the Pupil Referral Units?

Provision is delivered through three locality based PRUs:

- Bassetlaw Learning Centre covers
 Bassetlaw and Newark
- Daybrook Learning Centre covers Rushcliffe, Gedling and South Broxtowe
- Oakdale Learning Centre covers Mansfield, Ashfield and North Broxtowe.



Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Policy and Provision

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) co-ordinates a range of services which support children and young people with SEND to achieve their full educational potential. This includes the provision of specialist advice and support to children, families and schools.

Key Services

The service consists of a number of specialist areas, which provide support to children and young people with SEND.

Statutory Assessment and Placements

Coordinates the statutory assessment process and, where appropriate, the placement of children in specialist provision.

Schools and Families Specialist Services

Specialist teachers and teaching assistants work with children and young people with a range of complex SEND from birth to nineteen years in homes, early years settings and schools.

They provide specialist assessments and interventions, including services for children and young people who are deaf, visually impaired, autistic, or have cognitive learning difficulties.

Education Psychology Service

Enables improvements in the attainment and emotional health and well-being of the most vulnerable children through the application of psychology to education and child development

Personal, Social and Emotional Development (Nursery and Primary)

Provides advice and support to nursery and primary schools regarding children with the most severe and complex emotional and social needs. Support is delivered by specialist teachers and teaching assistants.

The service ensures that excluded pupils have access to appropriate education and are reintegrated back into mainstream education as soon as possible.

Children and Young people of secondary school age receive support through Pupil Referral Units within the Social, Emotional and Behavioural Development Service found in Section 2.2.

Parent Partnership Service

Provides advice and support for children with SEND and their families in relation to the statutory assessment process.

Physical Disability Support Service

Provides specialist advice to schools to promote the inclusion of pupils with complex physical or medical needs.

Health Related Education Service

Supports children who are unable to attend school for health related reasons, including:

- Pregnant school age learners and school age mothers
- Learners in hospital receiving treatment
- Children who are too ill to attend school.

Managing Actual or Potential Aggression

Offers specialist advice, training and support around the use of reasonable force and physical interventions within schools and associated settings.

Anti-bullying

Provides support and advice to schools in respect of the anti-bullying policy and strategies.

Post-16 Provision

Coordinates Post-16 Provision for students with SEND.



Who can access SEND Services?

This range of services support children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities to achieve their full educational potential.

How are the SEND Services accessed?

Contact with SEND services is usually initiated by schools, or by a referral arising from a professional assessment of a child's special educational needs.

Business Development and Support

Business Development and Support manages and coordinates all administrative staff across the department. The service is also responsible for transport policy development, including the Home to School Transport Policy and oversees travel arrangements across the department. Furthermore the service provides a range of advice, guidance and support services for School Governors.

Key Services

Transport Policy Development

Transport Policy Development ensures that County Council policies provide appropriate travel assistance for eligible children and young people up to the age of 16 to travel to and from school. The service also provides travel assistance where applicable for post-16 students travelling to education settings.

The service has an overview of other transport arrangements and travel schemes which are directly delivered across the department. This allows the holistic development of transport policies that best meet the needs of children and young people.

Youth, Families and Culture is responsible for services that form the Council's early help offer for children, young people and families. The Division also provides the Council's cultural services offer to all Nottinghamshire residents.

The Division's early help offer is provided through youth centres, children's centres and targeted support to best meet the needs of children, young people and families. Cultural services include libraries, country parks and support for sports and the arts.



Young People's Service

The Young People's Service provides access to high quality, safe and enjoyable activities for children and young people outside of the school day. It also provides a structure for children and young people to voice their opinions and to shape the services provided for them

In addition to open access opportunities for all children and young people, a range of specific services are delivered for particular groups.

Key Services

Children and Young People's Participation

- Manages the Young People's Board, locality and specialist boards and forums for children and young people's participation activities
- Organises the annual Nottinghamshire outstanding Achievement 4Uth Award
- Manages Nottinghamshire elections for the National Youth Parliament.

Looked After Children

- Provides access to organised fun activities with their peers for children and young people in the care of the Authority including those who are fostered or adopted
- Manages the Children in Care Council
- Supports young care leavers.

Play for Disabled Children

 Provides individual support to access mainstream activities for children and young people aged 5-18 years old referred by Children's Social Care.

Disability Support

- Provides nine open access Link Youth Clubs across the County
- Supports Nottinghamshire Pioneers Youth Forum
- Arranges programmes of residential events and activities during the school holidays.

Skills for Employment

 Delivers programmes of foundation learning for 16 and 17 year olds with additional support needs from six locations across the County.

Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme

- 2000 young people participate in the scheme each year through direct support of awards co-ordinators and volunteers to School and Open Groups
- The service helps facilitate expeditions and assessments along with providing quality assurance of the whole scheme.

C Card

Ensures young people have appropriate access to condoms.

Voluntary sector support

- Provides further open access activities for children and young people which is coordinated with the Nottinghamshire Voluntary Sector Youth Partnership. The Partnership consists of umbrella and uniformed youth organisations along with the seven Play Forums
- Grant aid is also provided to umbrella organisations and individual youth and play voluntary groups.



Who can access the Young People's Service?

The Young People's Service works with young people aged between 5-25. However, the priority age range is 13-19 which constitutes around 90% of Youth Work.

How is the Young People's Service accessed?

Open access opportunities are provided to children and young people through:

- 29 Youth Centres across the County, including new centres in West Bridgford and Sutton in Ashfield
- Staffing for over 10 voluntary sector youth clubs
- 10 Mobile Youth Facilities
- Play provision and support to Play Forums in each District
- 4Uth festivals and school holiday activity programmes.

Where is the Young People's Service delivered?

Provision is delivered through mobile Youth Centres, static Youth Centres or through the community.

To compliment mainstream education, youth activities are delivered before and after school, in the evenings, at weekends and during school holidays.

Early Years and Early Intervention

The Early Years and Early Intervention Service provides both universal and targeted services to parents and families from pre-birth through to 12 years of age, with a particular focus on supporting vulnerable parents and families. As part of Nottinghamshire's early help offer, the service is closely aligned with the Targeted Support and Youth Justice Service (section 3.3).

Key Services

Open-access services to parents and families from pre-birth through to 5 years of age are available through 58 Children's Centres across the County. Details of these Children's Centres can be found in section 4.4.

Enhanced family support is available to vulnerable parents and families from pre-birth through to 12 years of age, where children are at risk of poor outcomes.

The types of family support services available are:

- · Parenting Programmes
- 1:1 family support with a specific focus on parenting/behaviour and emotional health and wellbeing
- Supporting children's transition through education at key educational transition points.

FAQs

Who can access enhanced family support?

Vulnerable groups that may benefit from enhanced family support include:

- Teenage mothers and pregnant teenagers
- Lone parents
- Children in workless households
- Children in Black and Minority Ethnic groups
- Disabled children and children of disabled parents
- Other vulnerable groups in the children's centre area. This includes all families in most need of intervention and support.

How is enhanced family support accessed?

To make a referral for enhanced family support please complete the service request form which is Part A of the Common Assessment Framework (CAF) and either send it to your local Children's Centre that can be found in section 4.4 or to the Early Help Unit whose contact details are below. Parent/carer consent is required to make a referral.





As part of Nottinghamshire's early help offer, the service is closely aligned with Early Years and Early Intervention (section 3.2). The service also manages the Supporting Families Programme which seeks to support families in Nottinghamshire with acute and multiple needs.

Key Services

Targeted Support



Offending Teams (YOTs), for young people at risk of offending but who are not in the criminal justice system, and the Supporting Families Teams who work intensively with families with complex needs. Criteria for referral to Supporting Families can be found at

FAQs

Who is the Targeted Support service for?

If the following factors are present in a young person's life, they may benefit from a referral to Targeted Support:

- · Drug or alcohol problems
- Difficulties finding work, training opportunities or re-entering education
- Being at risk of involvement in anti-social behaviour and crime, including the risk of exclusion from school
- Going missing from home or problems with regular school attendance
- Being homeless, or at risk of homelessness
- · Acting as a carer for a disabled parent
- · Being pregnant or a teenage parent

Targeted Support will also accept referrals for all children of school age where there is persistent absence from school.

How is the Targeted Support service accessed?

To make a referral for targeted support please complete the service request form, which is Part A of the Common Assessment Framework (CAF), and to the Early Help Unit whose contact details are below. Consent of the parents (or young person if they are aged 13 and over and can understand the service on offer) is required aside from where referrals relate to persistent absence from school.

Youth Justice

The Youth Justice Service works with children and young people aged between 10 and 18 with the aim of preventing offending and reoffending. It includes representatives from local councils, the police, probation service, health authorities and a range of other agencies.

The service works with young people to help them face up to their crime, take responsibility for their actions and offers help and support if there are any personal issues like family background and friends that make re-offending more likely.

All referrals into the Youth Justice Service come exclusively through convictions upheld in Her Majesty's Court Service or through Nottinghamshire Police. All Youth Justice services are provided on a statutory basis.

Libraries, Archives and Information aim to be at the heart of community life by inspiring the enjoyment of reading and creating knowledge through access to information, learning and local heritage.

The Library Service

Across Nottinghamshire there is an extensive network of 60 libraries, found in section 4.5, and a fleet of three mobile libraries serving rural communities. These venues deliver a range of services including:

- Fiction and non-fiction books for all ages
- Free computer and internet access including computer skills training
- Free enquiry service called Ask Libraries
- Family and local history collections
- Exhibition areas, gallery space and meeting room hire
- Programme of regular activities and events
- Home library service for housebound readers
- For schools: supported class visits and regular book exchanges
- Health and Wellbeing collections including books on prescription.

The Education Library Service

The Education Library Service is a specialist subscription service for schools, day nurseries and education support services which offers access to an extensive selection of educational resources and provides expert knowledge.

Nottinghamshire Archives

Nottinghamshire Archives provide access to:

- Written, digital and visual archives relating to Nottinghamshire and Nottingham covering the past ten centuries
- Support to the public and groups to conduct research
- A programme of exhibitions, talks and events.

Adult and Community Learning

Adult and Community Learning work with partners including colleges, voluntary groups, schools and children's centres to provide adult education courses for local residents and their families within areas of greatest social and economic need. Courses cover topics including:

- Personal and Community Development Learning
- Wider Family Learning
- Family English, Maths and Language.

Achievement and Equality Service

Achievement and Equality is a specialist service that supports schools, colleges, early years settings and partner agencies to meet the needs of Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) children, young people and their families. The service works with new migrants and more established BME communities including those from Gypsy, Roma, Traveller backgrounds.

The service provides advice and guidance and some direct support and intervention, including home-school-inter-agency liaison. This is in addition to support around admission

Community Arts and Sports Development

Community Arts & Sports Development focuses on developing the independent arts and sports sectors and works with a range of partners across the County. Its aim is to increase opportunities for adults, families and young people to participate in high quality art and sporting opportunities.

Arts Development and the Rufford Craft Centre

Community Arts and Sports Development manages partnership arts programmes with providers to increase participation in the arts, for example:

- Creative Greenhouse is a network for developing creative industries across the County
- Specialist programmes to improve access to the arts for people with mental and physical disabilities and for older people.

The Rufford Craft Centre at Rufford Abbey Country Park comprises a gallery, creative learning centre and workshops with specialist ceramic facilities which are available to the public. It also offers visits for schools and hosts the Earth & Fire International Ceramics Fair.

- Increased investment in sporting activities by working with the National Governing Bodies for a variety of sports.

Country Parks and Green Estates

Nottinghamshire County Council manages several large country parks that are free and open to the public 364 days a year. The main Parks include Sherwood Forest National Nature Reserve, Rufford Abbey Country Park, Bestwood Country Park and Cotgrave Country Park.

Key Service Areas

Rufford Abbey and Sherwood Forest are major tourist attractions, attracting 450,000 and 350,000 visitors per year respectively. Bestwood and Cotgrave are primarily used by local residents and groups for recreation and leisure. Conservation work also takes place to develop and conserve nature habitats across the County.

In total, there are 60 Green Estate sites, in many different parts of the county.

These range from well known local beauty spots such as Daneshill Lakes, to small reclaimed colliery sites managed with the help of community volunteers.

Our country parks hold numerous special events that are open to the public, ranging from wildlife seasonal walks at Bestwood Country Park to large scale public celebrations such as a 1940s Living History weekend at Rufford Abbey.

The largest single event is the Robin Hood Festival at Sherwood Forest Visitor Centre, attracting 20,000 – 30,000 visitors each year.
