The South Wolds Academy and Sixth Form

Admissions Policy 2016-2017

The South Wolds Academy and Sixth Form works closely with 9 link primary schools on the transition from Year 6 to 7. These are Bunny Primary, Candleby Lane School, Cotgrave CofE Primary, Crossdale Primary, Keyworth Primary, Kinoulton Primary, Tollerton Primary, Willoughby Primary, and Willowbrook Primary.

Students from other primary schools may be successful in gaining a place at South Wolds; we will work closely with families and schools to ensure a successful transition where this is the case.

Admission Number

The proposed admission number for September 2016 is 150

Oversubscription Criteria

Where the number of applications for admission exceeds the number of places available, the following criteria will be applied in the order set out below to decide which students to admit once places have first been allocated to pupils who have a statement of special educational needs or Education Health Care Plan which names the Academy.

- 1. Children who are looked after, or who have been previously looked after, by the local authority.
- 2. Children who, at the time of admission, will have a brother or sister attending the Academy in Years 7 to 13.
- 3. Children who attend one of the 9 link primary schools. I.e. Bunny Primary, Candleby Lane School, Cotgrave CofE Primary School, Crossdale Primary, Keyworth Primary, Kinoulton Primary, Tollerton Primary, Willoughby Primary, and Willowbrook Primary.
- 4. Other children who live in the catchment area on the closing date for applications.
- 5. Other children who live outside the catchment area.

If applications exceed the number of places available the Academy will operate a waiting list in which priority for places will be given on the basis of the above criteria. In the event of oversubscription in any of the criteria proximity to the Academy will be measured 'as the crow flies' from the home address to the main reception office. Those living nearer to the Academy will be given priority. In the event that two or more distances are exactly the same then the Academy will use random allocation by lot, drawn by somebody independent to the Academy.

The Local Authority will publish the deadline for applications for September 2016

The Academy participates in the Fair Access Protocol.

The right to withdraw an offer

The Academy has the right to withdraw the offer of a place if any of the information given on the application is found to be inaccurate. This would include fraudulent applications, applications found to be intentionally misleading and false claims to residence in the catchment area.

Admission to the Sixth Form

The capacity for Year 12 is 150, with the admission number for external candidates is 30. Applications are made directly to the sixth form; details of how to apply are included on the Academy's website.

Students will be accepted on to Post 16 courses if they achieve a minimum of 3 grade 'B' and 3 grade 'C' passes at GCSE level. The sixth form prospectus published in September 2016 will identify requirements for individual subjects.

Where the number of applications for admission exceeds the number of places available, the following criteria will be applied, after those children with a statement of special educational need or Education Health Care Plan that names the academy have been admitted, in the order set out below, to decide which students to admit:

Students who are looked after by a local authority, or who have been previously looked after, and who meet the entry criteria

- Students who already attend the Academy and meet the entry criteria
- In the event of an over-subscription of the above criteria, and for all other applications, proximity to the Academy will be used with those living nearer being given priority. Distance measurements to be made 'as the crow flies' from the home address to the main reception office of the Academy. In the event that two or more distances are exactly the same then the Academy will use random allocation by lot, drawn by somebody independent to the Academy.

Definitions:

A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions in accordance with section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989 at the time of making an application to a school.

Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order). This includes children who were adopted under the Adoption Act 1976 and children who were adopted under section 46 of the Adoption and Children Act 2002.

Child arrangements orders are defined in section 8 of the Children Act 1989, as amended by section 12 of the Children and Families Act 2014. Child arrangements orders replace residence orders and any residence order in force prior to 22 April 2014 is deemed to be a child arrangements order. Section 14A of the Children Act 1989 defines a 'special guardianship order' as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian (or special guardians).

Parent

Section 576 of the Education Act 1996 defines 'parent' to include; all natural parents whether they are married or not, any person who, although not a natural parent, has parental responsibility for a child or a young person; and any person who, although not a natural parent, has care of a child or young person.

Having parental responsibility means assuming all the rights, duties, powers, responsibilities and authority that a parent of a child has by law. People other than a child's natural parent can acquire parental responsibility.

Siblings

For school admissions, sibling (brother or sister) includes half-brother or half sister or legally adopted child living at the same address as the child. It also includes a child looked after by a local authority placed in a foster family with other school age students. It also includes step children or children who are not related but live as a family unit, where parents both live at the same address as the child. Where one child of a multiple birth can be admitted, the other students will also be admitted.

Residence

This is defined as the child's permanent place of residence which is deemed to be the residential property at which the child normally and habitually resides with the person/persons having parental responsibility for the child at the time of completion of the application form. Proof of permanent residence and evidence regarding parental responsibility may be required. If parents live at separate addresses, whichever of the two addresses the child spends at least 3 school nights permanently i.e. Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday will be classed as their place of residence. An address of other relatives or friends will not be considered as a place of residence even when the child stays there for all or part of the week.

Further Details:

Late applications

Late applications are those submitted after the closing date for the co-ordinated admissions scheme and will be dealt with in accordance with that scheme. Late applications will be considered up to the date specified in the co-ordinated scheme providing the applicant can produce evidence that they have moved into the area after the closing date for applications or can establish at the time of completing the form that there were exceptional reasons for missing the closing date. Examples include family bereavement, hospitalisation. Supporting evidence may be required.

Waiting list

If, after the offer of Year 7 places has been made, the Academy is over-subscribed, all unsuccessful applications will be put onto the waiting list, which is administered by the governors of the Academy in partnership with the local authority for the duration of the co-ordinated admissions scheme. Once the co-ordinated scheme is closed, the waiting list will remain open until 31st December and will be administered by the governors of the Academy. The waiting list will be ranked in line with the published over subscription criteria. The Academy does not maintain a waiting list for mid year admissions.

Independent Appeals

Parents have the right to an independent appeals panel if you are not happy with the outcome of your application. Any repeat applications for the same academic year will not be considered unless there is a significant and material change in circumstances. Parents wishing to appeal should write to the Clerk to the Governors at the usual Academy address, <u>within 20 school days</u> of notification. Appeals will be held in line with the protocols and timelines in the School Admissions Appeal Code

Coordinated admissions scheme

All applications for places in the normal year of entry are made to the home local authority on the common application. Applications are considered in line with the local authority's coordinated scheme and set timelines. Places are allocated on 1 March.

Applications outside the normal year of entry

These applications should be made directly to the Academy. Details of how to apply are published on the website.

Applications for children outside of their normal age group

Parents may seek a place for their child outside of their normal age group. If this is the case then a letter should be written to the Head Teacher setting out the reason for the request. This will then be processed in line with paragraph 2.17 (A and B) of the Schools' Admissions Code.

Measuring distance 'as the crow flies'

For applications in the normal year of entry which are managed under the co-ordinated admissions arrangements distance is measured using Nottinghamshire County Council software computerised measuring system and the Academy governor's use this information to rank order applications.

For applications outside of the normal year of entry or for those applications held on the waiting list the governors of the Academy use Microsoft AutoRoute to measure distance.
