For some of those proposed for larger reductions, the budget has been identified as surplus owing to underspend. In these cases, there is no withdrawal of existing service involved. Therefore, this does not represent a negative impact on existing service users. (Community Resources to Support People, Young Carers, Substance misuse)	Discussions would be held with internal departments about how to accommodate the reductions. Consultation will be undertaken with the public and affected stakeholders as part of the Council's budget consultation.
Services for women, including pregnant women and those with young children: Children's Centres Family Nurse Partnership Services for young people and children: Supported accommodation for young people Young Carers C Card Scheme Youth Offending Team Substance misuse (young people) Services for disabled people: Young Carers Adult, Social Care and Health Mental Health Coproduction service Moving Forward service	There will be a more significant impact related to projects which have spent their allocations in full and which are proposed for reduction. This could be mitigated by use of Public Health reserves to offset or taper reductions, so that the impact would be either reduced or delayed.
