The Public Sector Equality Duty which is set out in the Equality Act 2010 requires public authorities to have due regard to the need to: Eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation; Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not; Foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.

The purpose of carrying out an Equality Impact Assessment is to assess the impact of a change to services or policy on people with protected characteristics and to demonstrate that the Council has considered the aims of the Equality Duty.

Part A: Impact, consultation and proposed mitigation

1 What are the potential impacts of the proposal? Has any initial consultation informed the identification of impacts?

The purpose of the statement is to clarify the position of Nottinghamshire County Council in regard to working with the Gypsy, Roma and Traveller community in Nottinghamshire. To set out actions to ensure that the needs of this community are addressed as evidenced in the Council Plan 2017-2021.

The potential impact is on Nottinghamshire County Council employees and partner agencies who have a role to play in working with this community.

The Gypsy, Roma Traveller community face "multiple disadvantages" In 2015 the Equalities and Human Rights Commission highlighted that these included:-

- Lower educational attainment
- Lower life expectancy
- Poor levels of child immunisation
- Greater prevalence of anxiety and depression
- Poor unemployment
- High levels of hate crime and racism
- High levels of domestic violence

The statement provides a framework for the County Council to structure its role in responding to these issues and developing a better relationship with this community. It will have a potentially positive
