Hi Steven

Thank you for the prompt reply and the courtesy of allowing us to still comment! i apologise that my previous comments weren't question linked!

In response to Question 3 we wanted to say Point 3. Minimise impacts on communities which reads "Minimise the adverse impacts on Nottinghamshire's communities by protecting their quality of life and health from impacts such as traffic visual impacts, noise and dust."

We would like to state that we consider that the impact should not be limited to adverse impact on Nottinghamshire's communities but also neighbouring areas. We are concerned about minimising lorry movements through our town and we find that as we are close to Nottinghamshire boundary planning applications for minerals can still impact heavily on ourselves. (e.g the new sand and quarry extraction application at Barnby Moor that will lead to up to 100 lorries per day going through our town, even though we are in Yorkshire)

I would be most grateful if these comments could be included in the consultation replies.

Thank you for details of the process. i was aware that the Issues and Options consultation was an early part of developing a new plan but wanted some details of further steps/consultations and when the plan would be ready for examination that you have answered for me!

Hi Angela,

Thank you for your email regarding the development of the new Minerals Local Plan. I am happy to give you a call however I thought I would set out the process in an email so that you have this for reference.

The Issues and Options consultation was the first stage in the development of the new Minerals Local Plan. The document set out the key issues we face over the next plan period to 2036 and potential options as to how to address the Issues. The document included a series of questions to help guide feedback (I have attached the document if you didn't see it originally). As you will see the document / questions look at the

draft vision and strategic issues, the amount of minerals required over the plan period, the geographic spread of sites across the county etc. rather than site specific allocations. Although the consultation has finished you can if you wish still make comments (send them to me by email) and I can add them to the consultation system, however they do need to be linked to specific questions included in the document.

Going forward, the next consultation stage on the Minerals Local Plan will be the draft plan. This consultation document will include a series of draft planning policies against which minerals development will be assessed, along with site specific allocations to meet expected demand. It will be at this stage that comments can be made on the specific sites being proposed for inclusion in the plan. This consultation is currently expected to be undertaken in June of this year. As previously done, Parish Councils and those that have responded previously will be informed before this consultation goes live.

Once the draft plan consultation has been completed, the comments made will help inform the final version of the minerals plan. The final version of the document will be consulted on – probably towards the end of 2018 or early 2019 before it is submitted to an independent inspector for examination.

The stages of consultation outlined above follows the same methodology as undertaken on the minerals Local Plan that was withdrawn in May 2017.

I hope this is helpful however if you still want to discuss the above let me know and I will give you a call.
