REPORT OF THE LEADER OF NOTTINGHAMSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

JOINT WORKING AND DEVOLUTION PROGRAMME AND LEVELLING UP WHITE PAPER UPDATE

Purpose of the Report

- 1. To inform Committee on the progress of the Joint Working and Devolution Programme and to update on the Levelling Up White Paper.
- 2. To seek approval to continue negotiations with Government about a devolution deal.
- 3. To seek endorsement for the continuing inclusion of Nottinghamshire's District and Borough Councils in the ongoing discussions about devolution.

Information

Background

- 4. As detailed in the update to Policy Committee in December 2021, following an invitation from Government for expressions of interest in a new type of devolution deal, Nottingham and Nottinghamshire Councils (City, County, Districts and Boroughs) have been working together on a <u>Case for Devolution</u>. This document was approved by the joint Economic Prosperity Committee in October 2021 and work has continued in partnership to develop detailed scopes for the six initial priority themes:
 - Enabling and supporting young people through their journey to adulthood
 - Education and Skills
 - Environment
 - Economy
 - · Connectivity and Infrastructure
 - Land and Housing
- 5. In addition to the above priority themes, our Case for Devolution includes a further "long list" of priorities, including:
 - Health and social care
 - Visitor economy, heritage and culture
 - Community safety, cohesion and reducing reoffending

Public sector reform

Levelling Up White Paper and Progress

- 6. The <u>Levelling Up White Paper</u> was published on 2 February 2022 and includes an invitation for nine county areas to begin negotiating devolution deals, including Nottingham and Nottinghamshire as well as other areas across the East Midlands. Government's aim is for a number of these deals to be agreed by Autumn 2022. In addition, the white paper commits that by 2030 every part of England that wants one will have a devolution deal with powers at or approaching the highest level of devolution and a simplified, long-term funding settlement. Trailblazer deeper devolution deals are to be progressed with the West Midlands and Greater Manchester
- 7. Page 140 of the Levelling Up White Paper sets out a Devolution Framework, which details the types of powers and functions that will be considered for devolution at three levels, defined by the criteria set out below. Level 3 deals offer the opportunity to devolve the greatest level of powers, flexibilities and funding from Government to our local area, please see **Appendix A** for details.
 - Level 3: A single institution or County Council with a directly elected mayor (DEM), across a Functional Economic Area (FEA) or whole county area
 - Level 2: A single institution or County Council without a DEM, across a FEA or whole county area
 - **Level 1:** Local authorities working together across a FEA or whole county area e.g. through a joint committee
- 8. Discussions are underway across the 9 areas named in the White Paper, including here in the East Midlands to confirm next steps and to agree the preferred form and geography of the devolution deals. In our case, there have been discussions between Nottinghamshire County Council, Nottingham City Council, Derbyshire County Council and Derby City Council and Government officials to explore the potential for a Level 3 Mayoral Combined Authority (MCA) across this geographical footprint. Joint working across this wider area is being explored because a Level 3 deal in collaboration with partners could bring significant benefits to local people. This geography is an accepted Functional Economic Area, currently covered by the D2N2 Local Enterprise Partnership. A Mayoral Combined Authority of this scale would compare with areas such as Greater Manchester and the West Midlands, increase our influence nationally and could secure greater powers and funding. The East Midlands has received proportionally less government funding and private sector investment for a number of years. It is incumbent upon local partners to explore opportunities to redress this imbalance. It is too early to say what form of devolution will be negotiated with Government and regular updates will be provided as the situation develops.
- 9. In support of the approach outlined in paragraph 8 above, work is underway to align activity across all Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire Councils into a single, coherent devolution offer. Alongside discussions locally and with Government, work continues to develop the priority themes outlined in paragraphs 4 and 5 above. The excellent collaborative work taking place in partnership with city, district and borough councils across Nottinghamshire has the potential to secure better outcomes and value for money for local taxpayers through public sector reform and efficiencies.

Next Steps and Resources

- 10. The next steps for the programme are to:
 - progress political discussions locally regarding our response to the Levelling Up White Paper;
 - work collaboratively across Nottingham, Nottinghamshire, Derby and Derbyshire to identify shared priorities and ambitions that would fall under a potential devolution deal;
 - return a devolution deal proposal template to Government by 25 March 2022, this requests information on the level of devolution deal being sought, the geography, the leadership and governance model; powers, functions and flexibilities being pursued from the Devolution Framework and other innovative ideas.
- 11. In respect of the Government template, this document allows for devolution proposals to be set out with reference to the devolution framework. It is intended to capture a summary of proposals. Responses will provide the starting point of negotiations for a devolution deal where proposals will be examined in more depth. Submission of this template does not commit the County Council to a single course of action. An update on progress with the template will be given at the Policy Committee meeting on 24 March 2022.
- 12. In line with paragraphs 10 and 11, approval is sought from Policy Committee to continue negotiations with Government. Regular updates will be provided to Policy Committee (or Cabinet should the proposed change to Executive Arrangements be agreed by Full Council on 31 March 2022) as negotiations progress and any final devolution deal will be brought to Full Council for consideration and approval. In seeking this approval, committee is also asked to endorse the continuing inclusion of Nottinghamshire's District and Borough Councils in discussions about devolution.
- 13. The recruitment of the previously approved programme team (funded from the shared National Non-Domestic Rates (NNDR) Pool Reserve) is progressing well, with many of the roles now filled. To provide the best opportunity to secure the benefits offered by the Levelling Up White Paper and the pre-existing partnership working between Local Authorities, additional resources may be required. Subject to next steps, there could be an intensive period of negotiations with Government. Work is underway with partners to map existing skills and capacity and to identify gaps, which could be filled by a combination of secondments from within the Local Authority partnership, new jointly funded posts and / or commissions for expert support from external agencies. Provision has been made within existing Place budgets to fund additional capacity and expertise over and above the resources from the NNDR pool reserve.

Other Options Considered

14. Do Nothing – We could choose not to respond to the invitation in the Levelling Up White paper to negotiate a devolution deal with Government. This option has been rejected as it would prevent the benefits and opportunities of devolution from being achieved. Likewise, Government's commitment to progress deeper devolution deals with areas such as the West Midlands and Greater Manchester emphasises the importance of achieving a successful devolution deal for our area, to avoid being left behind.

Reason/s for Recommendation/s

15. The right devolution deal would deliver economic and social prosperity across the region.

Statutory and Policy Implications

16. This report has been compiled after consideration of implications in respect of crime and disorder, data protection and information governance finance, human resources, human rights, the NHS Constitution (public health services), the public sector equality duty, safeguarding of children and adults at risk, service users, smarter working, sustainability and the environment and where such implications are material they are described below. Appropriate consultation has been undertaken and advice sought on these issues as required.

Financial Implications

17. Nottingham and Nottinghamshire's Economic Prosperity Committee approved an annual budget of £450k for the Devolution and Joint Working Programme on 29th October 2021. There are no addition financial implications detailed in this report.

Implications for Service Users

18. The Case for Devolution is ultimately about changing things for the better for local people and giving all our residents and businesses the best possible opportunities and experiences. The programme continues to be developed with this primary objective in mind.

Implications for Sustainability and the Environment

19. Enhancing and protecting the local environment and addressing climate change is a Priority Theme under this programme of work. The intention is to support delivery of existing strategies and cooperation on policy development ahead of the Environment Bill. An ambition is included to accelerate net zero targets for some Councils and assist all to achieve the existing targets set.

RECOMMENDATION/S

It is recommended that Committee:

- 1) Notes progress to date on the Joint Working and Devolution Programme and the update on the Levelling Up White Paper.
- 2) Gives approval to the Leader of the Council and the Chief Executive to continue negotiations with Government, about a potential Level 3 devolution deal across Nottingham, Nottinghamshire, Derby and Derbyshire.
- 3) Endorses the continuing inclusion of Nottinghamshire's District and Borough Councils in the ongoing discussions about devolution.
