The purpose of carrying out an Equality Impact Assessment is to assess the impact of a change to services or policy on people with protected characteristics and to demonstrate that the Council has considered the aims of the Equality Duty.

## Part A: Impact, consultation and proposed mitigation

1 What are the potential impacts of proposal? Has any initial consultation informed the identification of impacts?

The proposal describes how the implementation of a transformation project to further increase the capacity of the Council's homebased reablement service (START) is expected to result in subsequent savings in home based care.

The savings will be achieved by an additional 360 service users completing reablement across 2018/19 and 2019/20 combined. This will be achieved through embedding a culture and practice of continuous improvement within the START reablement service with emphasis on the following:

- Increase the capacity of the reablement service to be able to work with more people (including increasing the proportion of community referrals)
- Increase the number of referrals to the service, including people with more complex needs
- Reduce the time taken to complete reablement
- Consistently embedding an OT led, focused goal setting approach
- Improving system process to enable a more efficient flow of people through the service

The savings identified in this proposal add to the existing savings target of £185,000 in 2018/19, approved by the Adult Social Care and Public Health Committee on 8 January 2018, and are informed by the analysis produced by Newton. A transformation project has been established to increase the capacity of the START service whilst maintaining the positive reablement outcomes. This project is
