Background



- £220 million additional funding 2021-2022
 - preparation for the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF)
 - 1 year only
- Supports communities to pilot programmes and new approaches
- Within a national framework, responsive to local challenges / local need
- Test integration of types of interventions and greater flexibility between investment themes
- Four national investment priorities:
 - □ Investment in skills
 - Investment for local business
 - ☐ Investment in communities and place
 - ☐ Supporting people into employment



In Nottinghamshire



- UKCRF https://www.nottinghamshire.gov.uk/business-community/community-and-voluntary-sector/uk-community-renewal-fund
- 3 areas defined as "Top Priority"
 - Bassetlaw
 - Mansfield
 - Newark and Sherwood
- Projects can benefit one, all or a combination of areas but...
- …an open call is required



Local Priorities



- Helping those disproportionately affected by the pandemic to be supported back into work
- Supporting existing small businesses and encouraging new businesses
- Supporting market towns by improving footfall
- Encouraging more visitors to Nottinghamshire to help support the local tourism and hospitality trade
- Helping businesses improve their low carbon credentials
- Supporting the digital upskilling of the workforce to meet the increasing challenges of advances in technology



Overall Process



- Process
 - Gateway (pass or fail) and if passed progress to
 - Two-stage and scored Assessment:
 - Strategic Fit
 - Deliverability, Effectiveness and Efficiency
- Both equally weighted but note that projects that do not predominantly focus on priority areas must score a minimum of 80% to be shortlisted
- "Appointable projects" grouped into 3 bands
- Final submission based on ranking and financial ceiling



NCC Responsibilities



- Act as "Lead Authority"
- Manage the open call for projects
- Assess the submitted projects
- Develop a coherent set of projects for submission to government with member engagement
- Make a formal submission
- If successful and if projects selected, manage the grant process and returns to government
- Evaluate the programme



Intentions to Bid Key Messages



- Bids cannot be submitted for projects that benefit a single entity, for example a single business. There must be evidence of wider impact for multiple individuals, businesses or other organisations and communities
- A number of organisations indicated possible bids for capital. The UK CRF is predominantly revenue and for projects and programmes that address a theme or multiple themes and may therefore not be eligible or score well from the Intentions to Bid received
- We would urge potential applicants to use this time before submission to explore clear and credible collaboration with partners and fellow delivery organisations
- Looking for clear ability to deliver quickly and well with minimal risk over a short timetable



Intentions to Bid Key Messages (2)



- Full applications must demonstrate how they will impact on the themes and the local geographies, focusing especially on the 3 priority areas. The assessment process is geared towards the top priority areas
- The deadline for the submission of final applications is absolute and final
- Applicants must use the government's published application form:

- No other form of submission will be accepted
- A range of projects may be submitted but applicants are encouraged to maximise impact & deliverability through larger projects (£500k+)



Intentions to Bid Key Messages (3)



- The guidance is here:

 which should be read in tandem with the wider Prospectus
- Applicants should also note the Gateway Criteria and that this is pass or fail
- Reviewing the two-stage assessment process will help guide applicants as to how the scoring will be progressed
- Successful applicants will need to develop an evaluation plan with between 1-2% of their award to be dedicated to that evaluation with a minimum threshold of £10,000



Tips



- Read all the Guidance incl that offered to NCC as Lead Authority
- Reflect carefully on the geographical and thematic impacts
- Use the government-referenced impact / outcome indicators
- Use the application form note annex requirements
- Do not attach any additional info / weblinks
- Note any word counts
- Note the eligible / ineligible costs and the NCC management fee between 2-3%
