CHAIR'S REPORT

It was noted that Clinical Commissioning Groups in Nottingham and Nottinghamshire (excluding Bassetlaw) were to be merged by NHS England & NHS Improvement in October 2019. The new organisation will be established on 1 April 2020 and will be named the NHS Nottingham & Nottinghamshire Clinical Commissioning Group. NHS Bassetlaw Clinical Commissioning Group is not included within the merger and will remain a separate organisation.

The Health Foundation has published What the quality of work means for our health. This was deemed particularly relevant due to publication of the <u>Director of Public Health's annual report 2019</u>, the subject of which is *Health & Work*.

The Department of Health & Social Care has launched an information campaign to advise the public on how to slow the spread of Coronavirus (COVID-19) and reduce its impact - information is available online via www.gov.uk and the NHS website.

UPDATE FROM THE NOTTINGHAM & NOTTINGHAMSHIRE INTEGRATED CARE SYSTEM

David Pearson CBE and Dr Andy Haynes of the Nottingham & Nottinghamshire Integrated Care System presented to the Nottinghamshire Health & Wellbeing Board. An overview of progress to date was provided and views from members sought on how to ensure a co-ordinated approach between the Integrated Care System (ICS) and the Health & Wellbeing Board.

David Pearson explained that the ICS would help meet the needs of the population, with increased life-expectancy having huge implications for the delivery of care, particularly where there are greater levels of long-term conditions. There is compelling evidence from across the world that the integration of services works, with it still being crucial that policies are made and implemented

locally. The members and bodies comprising the ICS have the responsibility to transform the system, with the noted recognition that it was important to also collaborate with housing to improve outcomes.

NOTTINGHAM & NOTTINGHAMSHIRE INTEGRATED CARE SYSTEM'S APPROACH TO POPULATION HEALTH MANAGEMENT

Amanda Robinson, Population Health Management Programme Manager, provided the Health & Wellbeing Board with a presentation on Nottingham & Nottinghamshire Integrated Care System's approach to Population Health Management. This aims at improving the health and care of an entire population, focusing on improving the physical and mental health outcomes and wellbeing of people, whilst reducing health inequalities within and across a defined population. It acts to reduce the occurrence of ill-health, including addressing the wider determinants of health and care.

A number of evaluations have taken place to measure the success of the programme, including risk stratification, patient outcomes, health and care management, data & information systems. Members noted there needs to be a shift from demand management to health planning and the involvement of Public Health and the voluntary sector.

DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC HEALTH ANNUAL REPORT 2019: HEALTH & WORK

Jonathan Gribbin (Director of Public Health) and Dawn Jenkin (Public Health Consultant) presented the independent Annual Report of the Director of Public Health for 2019 on Health & Work.

The Board heard that there are 27,857 Employment Support Allowance claimants in Nottinghamshire. Fifty percent of claims are due to stress and anxiety with 11.4% due to musculoskeletal issues. The report focuses on how to address this and improve people's health by participation in 'good work'. The opportunity provides benefits to employees and their families but also to employers and the wider economy as good health and wellbeing is associated with increased productivity and growth.

Nicole Chavaudra, provided an overview of the *Worksop Works* initiative, which was recently covered on <u>BBC Radio 4</u> (13m:14s into the recording). Nicole Chavaudra emphasised the importance of building relationships with business forums and engaging with local employers.

Health & Wellbeing Board members agreed to contribute towards implementing the recommendations contained within the Director of Public Health Annual Report 2019.

BETTER CARE FUND PERFORMANCE AND PROGRAMME UPDATE (QUARTER 3, 2019-20)

Paul Johnson provided a performance and programme update on the Better Care Fund. This included delivery against the six key performance indicators, the financial expenditure and savings, scheme delivery, and risks to delivery for Quarter 3 (2019-20).

The Health and Wellbeing Board approved the Quarter 3 National Better Care Fund return, which was submitted to NHS England on 24 January 2020.
