Setting the scene






Nottinghamshire County Council provides more than 400 services.



These services help people who live, work, study, or visit Nottinghamshire.





Some services are for everyone, like:



- Country parks
- School admissions

Other services are more specialist, like:

- Helping children who need protection
- Supporting adults to live independently after illness

Here are the main changes:

1. East Midlands Combined County Authority (EMCCA)

EMCCA makes big decisions about transport, housing, and energy.



From 2026, some transport responsibilities will move from the county council to EMCCA.



We will still have a strong voice to make sure decisions help local people and businesses.

2. Local Government Reorganisation (LGR)




At the moment, there are two levels of local government in the county:



- Nottinghamshire County Council
- 7 District and Borough Councils








These councils will provide all services.

New councillors will be elected under this system.



Money for local services is still a challenge.

Nottinghamshire County Council is in a better position than many other councils because of careful planning.

Costs are rising and demand for services is growing.

We will keep finding ways to save money and give good value for taxpayers.

 We will involve people in decisions that affect them.




 We will design services with input from those who use them.



Our Council Plan is based on these principles.

It will guide how the Council works and makes decisions in the future.



The Plan is built around **3 key outcomes** we want for Nottinghamshire's people and communities.

For each outcome, the Plan explains:



• Success Means: How we will know our actions have worked.



• **Ambitions:** The main themes for each outcome.



 Priorities: Specific actions linked to these ambitions.

1. Stronger Families, Caring Connections



We believe everyone should get the best start in life.



All children should have a good education and live in a loving family home.



Family and close connections help us feel cared for and supported.













When families have a tough time, we will do what we can to help.

We will also support people who care for loved ones and celebrate the important work of carers across Nottinghamshire.

Success means:

 More children are ready for school and have good early development.

 Fewer children are suspended or excluded from school, especially those with extra needs.

 More young people are in education, training, or work, including those with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).



 Fewer children need a child protection plan to keep them safe.



 More carers are happy with the support they and their loved ones receive.



 More safeguarding concerns are reduced or removed after contacting adult social care.

We will...



The best start in life:



 Help parents and carers so more children can access early education and childcare.



 Work with partners to improve maternal health and wellbeing and encourage family physical activity.



 Support education providers so everyone gets a good education and can move on to training or work.



 Focus on the first 1,001 days of a child's life, including helping families to be smoke-free.

No child left behind:



 Work with schools to promote inclusion and reduce poor attendance.



 Improve support for children and young people with SEND through early help and planning.



 Make moving from childhood to adulthood better for young people with SEND and protected characteristics.

Safe and supported:



 Improve early help and social work services so children can thrive and stay safe at home.



 Help people care for loved ones as they get older or need extra support.



 Support older adults, including those with dementia, to live safely and free from abuse.



 Use our role as a partner and employer to create opportunities for people to age well and enjoy life.

Celebrating our carers:



 Make sure carers, including young carers, have support and social contact.



 Honour foster carers, kinship carers, and adoptive parents so they feel valued and supported.

2. Rooted in Communities, Thriving Together



We believe having a home and feeling part of your community helps people stay healthy, safe, and independent.



We want friends, neighbours, and local groups to look out for each other and help when someone needs it.



By giving people the right help, at the right time, close to home, we can stop problems from getting worse.



This means fewer expensive services and healthier, happier lives for everyone.



Success means



 People live longer, healthier lives, and health gaps across the County get smaller.



 People find it easy to get information about Adult Social Care services.



 More adults who get short-term help after illness or a stay in hospital remain independent and don't need ongoing support.



• Fewer adults aged 18 to 64 need to move into care homes for long-term support.



 More children in our care live in fostering or kinship care.

Healthier, happier lives:



 Work with partners to reduce health gaps so everyone can live longer and healthier lives.



 Support mental and emotional wellbeing by reducing loneliness and isolation.



 Encourage staff to use everyday conversations to help people improve health and wellbeing.




 Protect public health, for example by improving vaccination uptake.



 Work with partners to improve dental health by making sure everyone has access to fluoridated water.

 Use technology to help people stay independent and healthy at home.

Resilient communities:



 Reduce fraud and remove unsafe products from the market.



 Support communities during floods and other emergencies.



 Work with safety partners to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour.

 Encourage more people to foster or adopt so children can live in family homes.



 Provide more housing with support for young adults, care leavers, domestic abuse survivors, and people with complex needs.



• Work with partners to provide housing for older people and people with disabilities.



 Reduce homelessness and help people live in warm, affordable homes.



 Make pathways to good jobs, like apprenticeships, easy to access and practical.




 Help people find and keep good jobs, including carers and people with health issues or disabilities.




 Improve key job markets, like Adult Social Care, to make them more stable and high quality.

 Make recycling easier and more consistent across the County.


A Council That Leads, A Council That Listens

 Listen to local people and use their ideas to shape plans and services.




Nottinghamshire Today



To make this Plan, we looked at what life is like for people and communities in Nottinghamshire.




We have compared life here with life in other areas of the UK.



In this section, when we say "similar authorities", we mean other county councils in England.

Stronger Families, Caring Connections



Compared to similar authorities, Nottinghamshire has:



 More 3 and 4 year olds taking up free early education, but fewer children reach a good level of development by age 5.



 More young people (16–17) in education, work, or training, but fewer young people with special educational needs stay in education or work.



 A similar number of children with more than one Child Protection Plan, and fewer children whose plans last over two years.



 A similar level of satisfaction for people using Adult Social Care, but fewer carers get support from carers' groups or have someone to talk to.

Rooted in Communities, Thriving Together



Compared to similar authorities, Nottinghamshire has:



 More NHS health checks for those eligible, but people are expected to live fewer years in good health.



 More children in care with stable placements, but fewer children in care living in foster homes.



 Fewer older adults (65+) in residential or nursing care, but more young adults (18– 64) with long-term care needs living in care homes.

And...




 6,105 cases of fraud and cyber-crime reported in Nottinghamshire (including Nottingham City) so far in 2025, worth £20.4 million.



 The number of cases has more than doubled since last year.

A Connected County, Creating Opportunity



Compared to similar authorities, Nottinghamshire has:



 More passenger journeys on local buses and higher satisfaction with buses.



 Fewer roads needing maintenance and fewer people killed or seriously injured on roads.





 Less household waste recycled or composted, but lower amounts sent to landfill.

 More working-age people unemployed and lower average weekly pay.

Next Steps

To help us monitor our progress against this Plan:



 We will produce an Annual Delivery Plan each year that sets out what we will do to achieve our ambitions.



 At the end of each year, an Annual Report will also be produced that details our progress against key measures of success.
