

Victims and restorative justice



This easy read document tells you about victims of youth crime and restorative justice.

What is restorative justice?



Restorative justice tries to fix or reduce the harm to victims after a crime.



It gives people who have been affected – the victim, the person who did the crime, and the community – the chance to talk to each other.



The aim is that people can agree how to deal with the crime and the things that have happened because of it.

Victims of crime committed by people under 18



The police should ask victims of crime committed by someone under 18 if the Youth Justice Service can contact them about a restorative process.



Nottinghamshire Youth Justice Service works with Remedi which has specially trained staff who can give victims the chance to take part in a restorative process or be informed about the young person's progress if the victim wants to be.
