Following our recent wraparound conference, we want to extend a heartfelt **THANK YOU!**



Ben Kingston-Hughes is an international keynote speaker, author and multi award-winning trainer. His distinctive blend of humour, neuroscience and real-life practical experiences have made his training invaluable for anyone working with children. Ben had the audience captivated throughout his workshop as he spoke his research into the neuroscience of play and how play was innate.



Matt Ogle, Entire Clubs

Entire group UK is a not-for-profit organisation dedicated to saying yes to every child, especially those who are neurodivergent or have additional needs. Born from frustration with mainstream childcare limitations, Entire offers fully inclusive, affordable childcare and support, from nursery age to young adulthood. They help providers understand the difference between inclusive and fully inclusive practice. Matt shared his personal experiences as a parent and how this led entire clubs to evolve into ensuring all environments, we're fully inclusive. He led an interactive session, where he challenged providers to think about their practice and how they could become fully inclusive, whilst providing innovative and inspiring ideas to do this.



Helen Barnett, Toy Library

Helen has 30 years' experience of play, managing and delivering playwork services in Nottingham where she was the Training and Workforce Development Manager. Helen has worked for Toy Library since 2018 leading on quality and performance, training, and safeguarding. Helen delivered an Interactive play session with a focus on loose parts play and adaptable and inclusive activities. She shared the importance of play and provided play ideas for delegates to take away.




Rebekah Jackson-Reece, Out of School Alliance




Andy finished the day motivating the audience to be the best version of themselves and shared positive tools for delegates to take away.



What part of the day had the most impact for participants:
