## **Fire Safety**



There are more than 700 fires in homes in Nottinghamshire every year.



A smoke alarm can save your life.



If you are worried about fire safety or need help fitting smoke alarms please <u>contact</u>

<u>Nottinghamshire Fire and Rescue Service</u>.

## If your smoke alarm sounds



Activate your lifeline device if you have one.



Leave your home as quickly as possible. Keep low to the floor away from the smoke.



Phone 999 after you are out of your house.



Knock on a neighbour's door to ask to use their phone.

## If you cannot get out of your house



Phone 999



Activate your lifeline device if you have one.



Go into a room away from the fire and close the door.



Open the window and shout for help.

## Handy tips for fire safety



Have a smoke alarm fitted and make sure it is tested every week.



Make sure ovens, hobs and heaters are switched off after you have finished using them.




Keep clothing away from heaters.



Make sure you have put your cigarette ends out properly.




Never smoke in bed.



Make sure everything is switched off before you go to bed.



Always keep door keys in the same place.



Walk around and check your home before you go to bed and close all the doors.



Keep all escape routes clear of items and obstacles.

## **Keeping safe and sound**

House burglaries can have a long-term impact on victims. People can be very scared about being burgled again.

Specially trained carpenters who work for the police visit about 1,000 homes in the county every year.

These carpenters fit security door and window locks to the homes of elderly burglary victims and give people tips on how to help stop crime from happening to them.

### Handy crime prevention tips

Make sure all your doors and windows are locked properly if you are going out.



Do not leave windows open unless you are in the room.



Never tell anyone you are on your own.



Keep outer doors locked and take the key out of the lock.



If you have them, use door viewers and chains when you answer the door to check who the caller is.



Keep any spare keys to your house in a safe and secure place.



Cancel any deliveries if you are going on holiday or into hospital.

## **Doorstep Crime**



Don't answer your door to people you haven't invited, such as people who are offering to do work on your home or trying to sell you things.

## **Dealing with unwanted callers**




If it is someone important, they will have your contact details and send you a letter.



If you have to speak to the caller, talk to them through an open window instead of a door because it is easier to shut a window than a door if the person won't leave.



If you are expecting a caller:




 Use a door viewer or window to see who the caller is.



 Put the chain or bar on your door before you open it.



 Check the identity of the caller – If it is a genuine person they won't mind you checking their ID card.



 If you need to check an ID card is genuine, use a phone number from a bill or the internet.



 Do not use the telephone number on the ID card because the card might be made up as part of a scam.



 If someone refuses to let you see their ID card you should be very suspicious.

If you feel threatened or in danger phone 999 and ask for the police

### **The Nominated Neighbour Scheme**



The Nominated Neighbour Scheme helps to protect you from doorstep callers and rogue traders.



You can sign up to the scheme if you live in Nottinghamshire.



We will arrange for a neighbour to speak to doorstep callers for you.



This means that you don't have to talk to answer the door.



You can give the caller a card and your neighbour can deal with the call instead.



Your Nominated Neighbour does not have to be at home – they can talk to the caller over the phone.



The Nominated Neighbour will check the reason for the visit and check the person is who they say they are.



If it is okay, the neighbour will be with the caller when they visit and make sure the caller has left your house at the end of the visit.

## **Approved Trader Scheme**

**Checkatrade** 

We work with Checkatrade to help you choose a trader you can trust.



The traders have been checked by Checkatrade and Trading Standards.

You can also ask family and friends if they can recommend anyone.



We recommend that you get three written quotes before employing a tradesperson.

## NottsWatch – Nottinghamshire Neighbourhood Watch



Nottinghamshire Neighbourhood Watch aims to prevent and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour and to develop stronger and safer communities.

## Handy Persons Adaptation Service (HPAS)



If you are over 60 or disabled and need small jobs doing, or small changes to your home, HPAS can help.



For £15 we can arrange small jobs like putting up shelves or fixing door locks, or small changes to your home such as fitting a grab rail or a half step.

## **Checkatrade**

The jobs will be done by the approved traders on the Checkatrade scheme.



You have to supply the materials for the job but you can get up to £250 worth of adaptations in one job.
