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Visit to Southwell Workhouse

LGBTQ+ History Month celebrated key historic figures including Octavia Hill (co-founder of National Trust). With Nottinghamshire County Council's close links to Southwell Workhouse and Infirmary, the LGBTQ+ network organised a visit. The visit was wellattended and provided valuable insights into the history of the workhouse and its close historical connection to the Council's current social care work. This helped attendees understand the evolution of social care from the workhouse era to the present day. It also included a guided tour and a special peek at some of the collection.

Ageing in the LGBTQIA+ population



At the Ageing Within The LGBTQ+Community webinar, Dr. Paul Taylor-Pitt used his forthcoming book, "Still here! Still Queer! Now what?" to address issues relating to Inclusive care for the ageing LGBTQ+population. His book is based on interviews of 100 people aged between 40 and 60 highlights some of the unique problems affecting the LGBTQ+ community in regard to

care. It shows some of the causes, effects and suggests some solutions to problems such as higher social isolation, increased risk of mental health issues including, depression, anxiety, suicide ideation. He suggests that the current systems aren't aligned with LGBTQ+ issues and concerns and that systemic change is required to address these. He recommends that the NHS take proactive steps to ensure inclusive healthcare for ageing LGBTQ+, recognises chosen families rather than next of kin, and implements inclusive policies to remove barriers to dignified care in care homes and hospitals.

A group of network members went to the History Month celebration event, The Prohibition Roast where The Lord Roberts' Queen in residence, Liv, presented a night of live singing, lip-syncing and comedy with some of Nottingham's finest drag artists.

Transgender history (and why it matters to you!)

In this webinar, James Davison from the University of Liverpool and the Annual Trans Historical Conference, gave a brief history of trans identity and how it has been viewed and ignored by historians. The hour long webinar was divided into three parts:

Part 1 – tour of histories of individual trans people

Part 2 – relationships between these histories and experiences today

Part 3 - Q&A

Speeding through history, James covered topics including Hatshepsut who ruled Egypt, the Roman Empress Elagabalus, the Anglo-Saxons. Shakespearian actress Lady Rich Robinson. In each case James described how their 'transness' had been explained away and he demonstrated how these explanations didn't stand up to scrutiny. He then brought us up-to-date with Dr. James Barry, and Martha P Johnson and provided a number of 'further reading' suggestions with a list of books. podcasts and videos.

Octavia Hill

Octavia Hill (1838 to 1912) was one of Victorian Britain's most important social reformers. One of nine children, Octavia was born on 3 December 1838 at Wisbech in Cambridgeshire. Born into a family of radical thinkers and reformers with a strong commitment to alleviating poverty, she herself grew up in difficult circumstances due to the financial failure of her father's businesses. Home educated by her mother, she worked from the age of 14 for the welfare of working people.

Hill significant force behind was development of social housing. She believed in self-reliance and made it a key part of her housing system. Her early friendship with John Ruskin enabled her to put her theories into practice with the aid of his initial investment in 1864. She began buying neglected and decaying properties in London: overhauling them and transforming their tenants' lives. Her scheme was a success and rapidly expanded with new investors. By 1874 Octavia had over 3,000 tenancies around London. In the early part of her career, she used her skills as a manager of working-class housina to create healthier communities and trained other women to do the same. She established the idea of personal case work, the importance of good maintenance of housing, and believed in self-help rather than hand-outs for the poor. Hill coined the term 'the green belt' and worked to preserve it to give Londoners access to the countryside. Her ideas paved the way for modern town planning. She was instrumental in saving open space for recreation in inner-city London. Her work to preserve the Lake District from encroaching railway companies contributed to the setting up of the National Trust in 1894 of which she was a co-founder.

Octavia Hill reportedly had a 'passionate intimacy' with Sophia Jex-Blake, one of the first woman doctors. Subsequently, Octavia Hill's long-term companion was Harriot Yorke, who lived and worked with Hill for 30 years. They lived together in Marylebone Rd, London and in Kent. Hill and Yorke are buried together in the churchyard at Crockham Hill, near Edenbridge, Kent. Hill is celebrated with a blue plaque at 2 Garbutt Place, Marylebone, and a monument on the summit of Hydon Ball hill, looking out over the Surrey countryside.

Punching Above its Weight - Nottingham in the Context of Britain's Queer History

This public lecture, delivered by guest speaker David Edgley from Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage, offered a brief survey of the UK's queer history, heritage and activism, with a focus on those relevant to Nottingham and Nottinghamshire. Starting with the 1885 *Labouchere amendment* and including the imprisonment of Oscar Wilde, banning of The Well of Loneliness, the 1948 Kinsey report, the arrest of Alan Turing, the outing of April Ashley and the 1967 Sexual Offences Act and its deficiencies leading up to Section 28. It moved on to the positive legislation from 2000 onwards.

Out and about with Linden: Nottingham book launch

Photographer Stuart Linden Rhodes shared a collection of photographs from the Linden Archives telling stories behind the photographs.

Linden was in discussion with CJ De Barra from the Notts Queer History Archive to talk about the 90's queer scene. The show included photographs from Nottingham and the midlands from the era
