

Bereavement – who you need to tell



This easy read tells you who you need to tell after someone has died.

Who you need to tell:

A <u>step-by-step guide about what to do when</u> <u>someone has died is available on GOV.UK</u>. This information is not in easy read format.

Registering a death:



By law, when someone dies, their death must be registered.



This should normally be done with 5 days of the death.



This may be longer if the coroner is involved or if there is a delay in the council getting the medical certificate stating the cause of death.

The death must be registered by:

- a relative of the person who has died
- someone who was there at the death
- a person who lives in the house where the death happened
- an administrator of the hospital
- the person making funeral arrangements

If the death happened in Nottinghamshire, you can register the death at the registry office that is the easiest for you to get to.

















If the death happened in another county, you register the death in Nottinghamshire by completing a form at your local registry office. This will be sent to the right council.

You must take your identification (ID) with you. It also helps if you can take the birth certificate, NHS medical card and any marriage certificate of the person who has died.

The registrar – the person you register the death with – will give you a green "certificate of burial or cremation" form.

This must be given to the funeral director before they can make arrangements for a funeral.

Sometimes, this form will be given to you by a coroner instead.






You will be given certified copies of the register entry and can buy as many copies of the death certificate as you want to.

Tell Us Once Service

The government has a Tell Us Once service that makes it easier to let the government and the council know that someone has died.

Instead of having to contact lots of different council and government departments, you can use the Tell Us Once Service to give the information to the government only once.

If you don't want to use the Tell Us Once service, you must contact the lots of organisations separately.

You can ask the registrar to complete the Tell Us Once form with you when you register the death.

You can also use Tell Us One <u>using an online</u> form at GOV.UK.

To use the online form, you need a unique reference number given to you by the registrar. And you must complete the form within 28 days of receiving the reference number. <u>government's website</u>.

The <u>Baby Mailing Preference Service</u> is a similar service. Parents who have suffered the death of a baby can use the service to reduce the amount of baby-related marketing.

The government's Money Helper website has information about:

- getting help to pay for funeral costs

The Children's Funeral Fund for England is a government scheme which pays the costs of a funeral for a child.

A funeral director will help you with this or you can <u>find more information on the</u> <u>GOV.UK website</u>.

If someone has died with no relatives or friends to arrange the funeral, a public health funeral will be arranged by the local council.
